Hot off the press for this month is the news that we now have a cheaper energy deal in place for electricity, and it's "green". If you go to www.greenenergyuk.com it will provide more details, and there is an announcement later in this month's *News*. The basic deal is: 17.50p per day standing charge and 12.06p per unit used. A quick calculation of our own energy bills give a saving of approx 10%. To sign up you have to have an authorisation code which I am getting from the ORCC. This deal is open to everyone.

If you do not have access to the Internet, please give me a call and I will arrange for a brochure to be sent to you.

These discounts do not apply to sets and seed tubers, but we will be entitled to the 'bulk' purchase discount on these items even if you only order single bags.

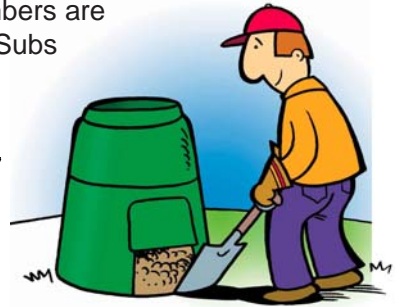

Jam Jars

You may have seen the "daft" headlines in last month's Daily Mail, about new EU directives that could result in fines of up to £5000 for "offenders" who re-use jam jars to make home-made preserves, jams and pickles, and then offer them for sale.

Under the Food Standard Agency's guidelines, it is fine to re-use jars for your own use and to give as gifts to friends. What you should not do is either sell or give these foodstuffs away at a public event. The crux is whether or not the item is "placed on the market", which means "*the holding of food or feed for the purpose of sale, including offering for sale or any other form of transfer, whether free of charge or not, and the sale, distribution, and other forms of transfer themselves.*"

Sadly, this means that jams and preserves cannot, legally, even be offered as prizes in raffles or sold at events like the Village Fête, without a "Declaration of Compliance" certificate – which any home producer is unlikely to possess. For further information visit www.food.gov.uk.

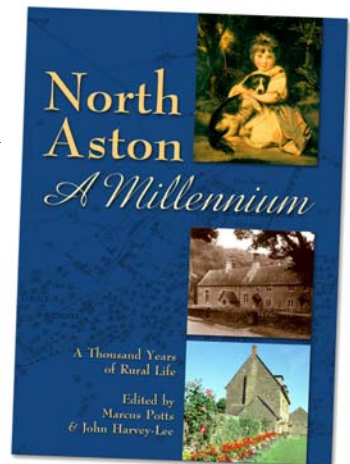

The Nights are Drawing In!

The clocks have gone back, the dark nights are approaching, and the Thames Valley Police anti-burglary team has produced a plan to try and prevent or reduce the traditional increase we get in house burglaries at this time of year.

We suffered 34 house burglaries in November last year in the Cherwell area (Banbury, Bicester, Kidlington and everywhere in between). This may not sound a lot, but November is by far the worst month for these crimes.

The spring/summer campaign, "Don't Get Burnt", was relatively successful. House burglaries were down by over 21% (when compared with the same period last year) and detection rates achieved 37%. This has in part been down to householders securing their properties better and contacting police with information, so thank you for your help throughout the summer.

Late Home from Work

The winter holds a different set of challenges. With the clocks gone back, night descends at four pm. For those that don't get home from work until six, that means easy pickings for opportunist thieves, who can easily spot an empty house.

There are some easy and inexpensive actions you can take to protect your property and help us prevent you from becoming a victim of burglary.

Consider how your house looks when you arrive home in the dark. If it looks cold and empty to you, then what does it look like to a burglar? Most offences of burglary are opportunistic. Properties are not generally targeted but offenders will see a chance and take it.

The Lights are on, but Nobody's Home!

A cheap device for deterring burglars is a timer plug which you can set to switch a lamp on when it gets dark. These can also be used to switch on a radio, which can easily give the impression of people being at home.

There are also devices such as "dusk-till-dawn" bulbs that automatically switch on when it becomes dark, and other lamps which simulate the flicker of a television, all of which can help to make it look like somebody is home.

Be a Good Neighbour

Other actions, such as getting your bins in after they have been emptied and pushing mail through letter boxes can also help. Don't be afraid to walk up somebody's drive and push junk mail through the letter box if it's sticking out!

We encourage good neighbour schemes and ask that you keep an eye on your neighbour's houses. You know better than anyone else when something is out of place or suspicious



in your own street, and if you see something you are not sure about, give us a call on the non-emergency 101 telephone number, or dial 999 in an emergency and we will come and check it out. Action always beats re-action!

Mane Platting

Over recent weeks unknown persons have been platting the mane of a pony near Bicester. It is not known exactly when this has been taking place, but information suggests that this is a sign to a particular criminal fraternity for the horse to be stolen. If you have recently experienced this issue or do in the future please call 101, the TVP non-emergency number.

Distraction Burglary

On the afternoon of the 12th October an 84 year-old resident was victim to a burglary in Kidlington which can be a lesson to us all. The offender pretended to be from the water board. He was described as a white male, between 30 to 40 years old of medium build and approximately 5 feet 6 inches tall. He was wearing a dark hat and a dark coat. TVP are seeking witnesses, so if you have any information please contact them on 101. If not, just be wary of anyone asking to enter your property, and insist on seeing identification.

Offender Brought to Justice

In September we reported the theft of two vehicles from Westfield Farm, Steeple Aston. After some good work by PC Sullivan, Robert Jackson has now been reported for summons for the theft of both vehicles.

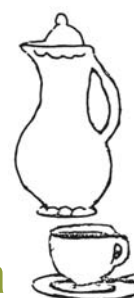

Local Roadworks

Several of the roads and lanes nearby are subject to closures and potential hold-ups over the coming weeks.

As some may already have discovered, the railway bridge between Somerton and Ardley is already closed, and will remain shut for some time - perhaps well into the New Year. This is required for complete refurbishment of the steelwork of the bridge, which will include grit blasting, structural repairs and repainting. Additional remedial work to the brickwork may also be carried out, as necessary.

Somerton Road in Upper Heyford is also subject to occasional closure while the overhead power lines are replaced. 11 of the wooden support poles are being renewed as well as the intermediate cabling.

Councillor Calling



Free Parking!

It has been announced that parking will be free in Bicester and Banbury on Saturdays, Sundays and Mondays in the run-up to Christmas – check the signs for details, of course, to make sure you've got the right day and don't get caught out! It's going to cost £100k in lost revenue but should help both traders and the rest of us in these tough times, especially in Bicester which will then be at the peak of its building works. Do, please, take advantage of it to support our local shops and businesses.

Press Reaction

This told a strange story: the *Bicester Advertiser* lined up a vocal group to say this wasn't enough and to demand more (at what cost to the taxpayer?) while the *Banbury Guardian* reported a series of positive responses welcoming the offer and urged readers to come and shop in town. I suppose that's the difference between pessimism and optimism – but I'd rather have a paper that supports its town than one which is so relentlessly knocking and negative.

Upcoming Traffic

Traffic is indeed going to be difficult in Bicester for some time (31 weeks according to the signs but, if things go well, it could be less) as all the roads are re-jigged to connect up the roof top car park above the new Sainsbury, to get buses to their new bus station, make St John Street two-way and generally unclog through traffic while getting shoppers in and out of the town centre. We'll all need a lot of patience (though the end is in sight, with Sainsbury apparently now on track to open as early as the summer). Thanks to the (totally unconnected) gas main diggings in the Buckingham Road, I've already got used to going round the northern route to the station (as taxi drivers always have, so the penny should have dropped sooner) and I suspect we'll all be doing that when we don't need to reach the town centre itself.

Planning

The Oxford Canal is now officially a Conservation Area so any development which might affect its setting must, from now on, "preserve or enhance" this treasure. Bicester's future is taking shape with the end of consultations on 10th October on its *Masterplan*, while the *Banbury Masterplan* is getting ready for your comments. There was a big response to the Local Plan, including my pennyworth, which picked up lots of general issues as well, crucially, as several points that would have impacted the Astons & Heyfords if they had slipped

through. Now the battle is on to make sure those changes are implemented!

Developers

Meanwhile, developers are already trying their luck on sites which get a mention in these, as yet unapproved, *Plans*, hoping to find a sympathetic Inspector on appeal and get lucky – not exactly the way "Plan-led development" is supposed to happen. Such premature applications, of course, turn the whole Plan system back-to-front so I hope Inspectors can be persuaded to hold the line until we've gone through the proper process and everyone has had their say taken into account.

On the Rails

Rail plans are moving on in the background, with a Development Board now formed to manage the East-West Link from Oxford via Bicester Town over to Bedford. Combined with the Evergreen Project to upgrade the Oxford-Bicester line, developing a park-and-ride station in place of those hideous wartime grain silos south of Kidlington and linking to the Marylebone line. This will hugely improve our public transport options, not in some distant future but in the next couple of years.

Finances

These brought a bit of a cloud in the month with changes to Government grants and the handing of welfare payment funding (though with less funds!) to councils adding up to a £2.6million shortfall over the period 2013-17. Before we panic, this is, of course, the cumulative total so the savings required in each of those years is a lot more manageable than the headline millions might make us fear. But we still need to brace ourselves because, over recent years, we have relentlessly ground out efficiencies within the council and, when those began to run dry, merged management with South Northants District to save yet more. So the \$64,000 question, if we are not to cut services, is where next? Expect much agonising and hard thinking.

Council Tax

The decision on Council Tax for next year is now quite straightforward: keep it the same and there's a 1% bonus Government grant, increase it by up to 2% and you're on your own, increase over 2% and you need an expensive local referendum which will eat up most of the increase – you don't need the brains of an Archbishop to guess the preferred option!

Having somehow got on to Bishops, I'll end with the splendid **St Frideswide** service in Christ Church Cathedral, where the representatives of the county civic, university and ecclesiastical gathered for the annual commemoration of Oxford's founder. I was there to represent St John Ambulance and so, from a humble place, could enjoy the procession of chains, maces and mitres as we went to lay our sprigs of rosemary on her tomb – a wonderful celebration to be part of.
