Road Works

By the time you receive this the resurfacing work on Station Road in Lower Heyford, and up the hill to The Holt, should have been completed. Similarly, the work through the base at Upper Heyford, and also the on-going work between the Ardley incinerator and Middleton Stoney should also be nearing their end. So too the new traffic lights in Bodicote, scheduled to be up and running by 13th August - and a huge sigh of relief all round.

Work is under way on the new development along Banbury Road by Home Farm in Bicester, for anyone using that route to or from the town. That will be a regular hindrance until October, as will work near the M40 junction on the A41 at Wendlebury. Thankfully, nothing major scheduled nearer to home, although the Middle Aston Lane looks in danger of a complete breakup.



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On the Land



July - August 2014

Continuing our series that looks at what's happening on the land around the village, this month we have submissions from **James** of North Aston Farms, **Liz** from the Nursery and **Mark** of North Aston Organics.

North Aston Organics

I always look forward to the start of the local cereal harvest as it means all the Wood Pigeons that have been molesting our young plants in Mill Field transfer to the arable fields to gorge on all the spilt grain. After that they move on to the young Oil Seed Rape plants (a member of the Brassica family, their preferred vegetable) and we don't see them again until mid November when they would strip our Brussels and Purple Sprouting Broccoli if we did not cover them.

Interestingly, the pigeons around Beesleys Close in the village are not tempted by the ripe barley, oats and wheat and remain in residence and so we have to keep the unsightly covers on the Calabrese we grow in the market garden from planting to harvest! We also have to put fine mesh covers over the carrots and parsnips to keep off the Carrot Root Fly, for which beastie there does not appear to be any effective predator or parasite.

Hey, ho - back to the watering.

Nicholsons

Life is good on the nursery and out in our gardens. We are all enjoying working in the sun following the last two challenging summers.

The early spring gave us a cracking start to the growing season and all the grass and borders grew with such English garden abundance but the recent arid conditions have challenged this lush growth and now we are facing plants really struggling to keep up with the rapid water loss. A few interesting thunderstorms have certainly helped a little but as we all know, most of that rain (30 mm in 45 minutes) missed our soil all together and shot off down the village, racing past the Lodge in torrents ...

Does anyone else remember as kids treading on the wild verge geranium in July and always getting thunderstorms that night? As a small child in my Gloucestershire village, we called them "thunder flowers" for this very reason and yes last week, I crushed one accidentally underfoot on the day of the most raging storm ... it is nice that some things simply don't change.

North Aston Farm

Wow – will the grass ever stop growing? Usually it is great to have lots of grass but we are pretty understocked with animals at the moment so it feels like we have been cutting and wrapping bales for ever. One big problem we have had this year is bird damage to the silage bales in the field. In some fields nearly every bale had been pecked which is quite dispiriting. As soon as air enters the bales the silage will start to decompose and moulds can form. The cost of the plastic alone for each bale is about £2.00 so the pesky rooks are a real nuisance. We have had to buy expensive patches to stick over the holes but only time will tell what the long term damage will be!

We are about to get a new South Devon bull to put with our retained heifers. We used to have Gareth the Angus bull but he had become a bit of a handful and would quite happily leave the herd of cattle we had left him with and go off in search of other more interesting cows around the farm - leaving a trail of broken fences in his wake. The South Devons are so much gentler!

We have had a torrid time with our sheep this last month. The lambs seem to have picked up an unidentifiable bug which has given them a nasty scour and caused them to lose rapid condition. Despite many faecal tests and more than one post mortem the vets cannot put their finger on the cause. We have wormed them and sprayed them to protect them from the dreaded blowfly and moved them to fresh pasture. Thankfully some of them seem to be improving.

The barley and pea mix has been cut, baled and wrapped and I thought that this would be some good winter forage. The expected poppies did not arrive but charlock did – in profusion in Upper Field making it look more like a field of oil seed rape than barley - and now I have read that charlock seed is toxic to livestock!

As I sit in the Rectory typing this, we've had a few thunder storms, but the sky is blue and on the whole the summer is pretty good.

I have been reading in the paper about what was happening a hundred years ago this summer - the things that were on most people's minds, the things that the newspapers were reporting. The weather was good then too, Charlie Chaplin was the film star of the day, people were complaining about being stopped for drinking and driving when they were 'perfectly safe' (there were 2,099 road deaths in 1913 as opposed to 1,754 in 2012; yes, I know, those figures are the right way around), off the peg clothes were all the rage (Burberry Completed Suits - "It's worth enquiring into"), and tinned food was feeding a nation that couldn't cook veg to save its life.

There were strikes in the mines, on the railways and in the mills. Rickets and tuberculosis were common. Life expectancy for men was 49 (79 now), for women 53 (82 now).

They had no idea what was coming.

On August 4th, the centenary of the beginning of the Great War, there will be vigils all around the country. There will be a vigil in Steeple Aston for the whole benefice. The bells will be pealed, half muffled, from 8pm till 9pm, and then at 9pm we will hold a vigil service in the church there. There will be candles representing each person from our community who died will be lit and extinguished as we remember them. Please come. Please join with us as we take time to hold this moment in our history and value it together.

The following Sunday at 9.30am (10th August), our morning church service in North Aston will be a family service and we will take a moment to remember those from North who served, and celebrate peace and the joy of the life we have together. This will be a celebration of life, a thanksgiving for all we have as well as a remembering of the past, and again, all are very welcome.



We see separatists fight their near-kinsmen in Ukraine, and families of foreigners watch on, weeping, as they wait for news of the bodies of their loved ones.


We see Israel and Hamas. Hamas and Israel. Head to head, toe to toe, endlessly repeating things that should never be done.

From Thames Valley Police

Rogue Traders

In the last few weeks leaflets have been put through doors in the area offering Guttering and Minor Building work. Thames Valley Police and Oxfordshire Trading Standards would like to remind everyone that they advise householders not to commission services or buy at the door and to check out traders thoroughly before employing them.

Advice on legal traders can be obtained from the Oxfordshire Trading Standards *Buy With Confidence Scheme*.

Rogue traders are known to leaflet drop prior to visiting an area and then use high pressure tactics to get work. They regularly target elderly and vulnerable people. Suspicious traders can be reported via the Trading Standards Website above.

It is recommended that you should always get more than one quote from reputable tradesmen and not buy at the door. If you are experiencing high pressure sales, shut the door and ring 999.

Illegal Raves

With summer upon us, all farmers and land owners are advised to remain vigilant to the possibility of unlicensed musical events (Raves) being organised on their land. Thames Valley Police is asking members of the public to be alert to any possible rave-related activity.

This could include: The removal of locks from secured access points; vehicles, particularly panel vans or larger, driving off-road; groups of vehicles congregating in rural areas; convoys of vehicles; loud music from remote woodland.

If you spot anyone acting suspiciously who may be conducting early reconnaissance on rural land or even starting to set up an event, please report it on the Thames Valley Police non-emergency number, 101, as soon as possible.

Chief Inspector Jim Weems said: "Thames Valley Police will take a robust line with illegal rave activity. Anyone considering holding or attending this type of event should reconsider their intentions carefully we urge owners of land or buildings to take steps to prevent raves taking place there."

There is a process for the legitimate organisers of events to apply for a *Public Entertainment Licence* to hold musical parties both indoors and outdoors. The granting of this licence,

through an application to the local council, follows consultation with the local police and fire service. The licensing process ensures that the impact to the local community is taken into account with conditions being imposed if required. It also ensures the safety of those attending the event. By receiving early warnings, Thames Valley Police has a much better chance of disrupting the rave and dispersing those responsible for its organisation.

Neighbourhood Watch

No response to our appeal last month - hardly surprising, I suppose. Neighbourhood Watch is an important part of working together as a community and usually sees people working together to take action to cut crime. These schemes work by developing close liaison between households and the local police and can help to cut crime and the opportunities for crime. They also help to reassure those who live in the area, encourage neighbourliness and closer communities, and reduce household insurance costs.

Councillor Calling



Democratic Deficit

This month saw an unusual Special Meeting of the Council, convened out of sequence to meet a deadline for submissions to the Local Government Boundary Commission for England. As I've previously reported, they step in to redraw council wards whenever population movements mean that some have grown too big while others are too small, giving some voters an unfair advantage over others.

Unfortunately, the LGBCE seems to be a quango of retired civil servants and others with no hands-on experience of local democracy, whose attempts at improvement will make things very much worse indeed. For some reason they don't like our system of electing a third of the council each year, despite the fact that this gives continuity of policies, avoids election gimmicks and giveaways and ensures councillors are alert to the feelings of residents all the time, not just once every four years. To discourage this, they insist it can only be done where there are huge, three-member wards which, while it seems to suit our towns, is plain daft in rural areas where lumping together up to twenty communities will be hugely damaging to democracy at a time when it's already hard enough to get people interested in taking part.

As a councillor, potentially sharing a ward with two others of different parties, keeping up ties with parish councils will become practically impossible and detailed local knowledge very difficult. Attempting to be everywhere across such large distances would impose an impossible workload – remember most have to fit this in between a full time job and their families, let alone any other interests. As a parish council, it will become very difficult to know who to turn to for help, while connections with residents will become ever more tenuous. So much for "localism"! A cynic might think the LGBCE agenda is to squeeze out independents and small or new parties, who won't have the local connections or resources to gather votes over such huge distances – whatever their motives, there's going to be real damage to local democracy.

Sadly, their rules are so rigid and numerical straitjackets so tight that the council, to have any influence over the outcome, has had to fall in line. To try and avoid any rancour, we set up an all party group and, happily, apart from one minor boundary spat within Banbury, which was so arcane as to baffle me, our submission was unanimous. You can see the resulting map on the CDC website. The only way to make the figures work was to split the Astons & Heyfords ward along the Cherwell – which at least has a good historical basis! We will, assuming the LGBCE doesn't have its own daft ideas, be divided among two mega-wards:

Adderbury, Astons & Deddington will consist of the Astons, Duns Tew, Deddington, Adderbury, Milton, the Barfords, South Newington and Wigginton.

Fringford, Heyfords & Launton will consist of the Heyfords, Somerton, Fritwell, Souldern, Ardley, Middleton Stoney, Stoke Lyne, Hardwick, Cottisford, Hethe, Fringford, Mixbury, Finmere, Newton Purcell, Stratton Audley, Godington, Launton and Blackthorn.

As you can see, a mathematical triumph and a democratic disaster! What on earth does Launton, effectively a large adjunct of Bicester, have in common with Somerton? I rest my case...

There will now be a period for "consultation" and you can tell the LGBCE what you think but, as the council has found, you cannot achieve sensible single-member rural wards within the rules they impose and, as they are in effect accountable to nobody but themselves, that's it.

Oddly, the Astons & Heyfords will have one last hurrah, when Mike Kerford-Byrnes stands next year (at the same time as the General Election), before this monstrosity is imposed in 2016, so you'll be asked to vote three years in a row. As this year had the Euro election and next year is a General, I suspect that by 2016 our enthusiasm for elections might be waning. I'll certainly have to think hard about whether, after serving you for 14 years and three elections, this ridiculous new burden isn't beyond the call of duty. If there's any masochists out there, now might be your opportunity....
