North Aston Nature Notes

With Stephen Rees

First, the good news - there have been hedgehogs in and around the village. Marcus recently found six young ones in his garden, and the Browns had an adult. We have also seen loads of droppings on the lawn, along the path, and down the bottom of the garden at the back of our house. Marcus's unfortunately became orphans, so were packed off to St Tiggywinkles (*see footnote*).

The cuckoos have long-gone now. We only heard the call twice this year, but when we were little they were a constant sound and we used to see them all the time. Now they seem to be a lucky spot - strange how things change, but I think this change is man-made, with people shooting migrant birds across the Mediterranean countries.

July is traditionally the month for butterflies but it seems to me they have been few and far between this year. Normally our buddleia bush is alive with Red Admirals and Peacocks, but not this year. Last week, for about three days, the field with the crop (next to Rams Spinney) was alive with Small Whites - hundreds of them flying from plant to plant. Lots seemed to be in pairs and kept chasing and annoying each other. I stood and watched them for a good while, and they made a wonderful spectacle.

The next field over had been baled up and left with short grass, and there was not one single Small White to be seen, but lots of Meadow Browns. They are very pretty and a very busy little butterfly.

I have seen one Gatekeeper, which is usually another common one and easily identified by having a black spot on its wing with two white dots in it.

Our resident Sparrow Hawk is still with us. We see him every time we go and sit down the bottom of the garden, shooting along just above the ground and then, with awesome skill,

darting over the hedge to surprise the Great and Blue Tits on the other side.

After a few months of absence the Little Owl is back in his favourite oak tree near the cattle sheds. We have been seeing him regularly again, and he is a cocky little devil - the way he looks at you as if to say hurry up and go away, this is my spot.

The sad news is that I found a dead mole (in late July) in the middle of a field. There was a hole in the grass and next to it, there he was, still warm and soft. I don't know why he dug himself out.

Here's hoping August brings us more butterflies, before we turn around and the next thing will be the swallows leaving. Blimey summer comes and goes so fast! At least we have the blackberries to look forward to. The bushes have lots of blossom, so with a bit of luck we will have a good harvest of one of the best free things that you can get.

Update from St Tiggywinkles on 26th July: There is both good and bad news regarding the North Aston hedgehog family. Very sadly the adult and one of the babies died. The poor mum (if it was the mum?) was in a very bad way and died the next day. She was very weak, dehydrated and seemed to have been poorly for a little while as she had lots of maggots present. The smallest of the litter was also very weak so sadly did not pull through. Our veterinary team did everything we could to give them the best possible chance of recovery; it is such a shame that they did not make it but at least they were kept warm, safe and free from pain. However I'm very pleased to report that the remaining babies are doing very well. They are in our mammal nursery being hand reared and are gaining weight every day! These youngsters are now even starting to lap food by themselves. It is very lucky that the mother was spotted and that the finder knew she was in trouble, as it would be very unlikely that any of this little family would have survived without intervention and veterinary care. Please do pass on our thanks to those involved in the rescue. Best wishes, St Tiggywinkles.

Broadband into North Aston



We have received an update from Deirdre Considine at *Better Broadband Oxfordshire*, clarifying a few points.

She confirms that super-fast broadband is still expected to reach North Aston "by December 2016". She advises that, while aware of our offer to assist with digging a trench and access, "BT will use existing duct work to bring the fibre to the village to minimise costs and the schedule includes accessing these ducts. The new cabinet will be installed in close proximity to the existing cabinet (*outside 4 The Green*) and in the event private wayleaves are required the owner of that property will be contacted. If we require assistance from the Parish Council (*sic*) at this point we will make contact with the Parish Council."

She goes on to say that "there are aspects in the presentation of data at postcode level which make it impossible to confirm whether all premises within a postcode are covered by the *Better Broadband* programme. There are limitations due to the distance of individual premises from a serving cabinet, as well as postcodes in which different infrastructure serves the premises within that postcode. In these cases the map (*on the BBO website*) does not separate those premises within a postcode served from a fibre-enabled infrastructure, or non fibre-enabled infrastructure." This suggests there may yet be some households in North Aston that won't benefit from the higher speeds, even after fibre reaches the village in December.

She concludes by saying that "the plans may yet change or be delayed ... because the surveys can encounter unforeseen difficulties and plans may be forced to change."

Various messages from TVP and Action Fraud this month ...

Use of Drones

The warmer weather encourages the use of drones - unmanned aerial vehicles or flying cameras - and TVP is concerned that some users may not be fully aware of the regulations.

Misuse of a drone can be a criminal offence and anyone considering flying a drone for recreational purposes should consider the following guidance:

You must not fly the drone higher than 400ft in altitude or further away than 500 metres from where you're standing. If your planned flight exceeds these limits you will need to seek permission from the Civil Aviation Authority (CAA).

You must avoid flying within 150 metres of a congested area or within 50 metres of a person or a vehicle - airborne or on the ground.

Use your common sense, fly responsibly, and make sure you can see the drone at all times. If you are using a drone with a camera, you must inform anyone likely to be photographed before you start recording.

Breaches of drone regulations (Article 166 & 167 ANO 2009) will be investigated by Thames Valley Police.

Somerton Burglary

There was a burglary from a farm on Heyford Road in Somerton overnight between Monday and Tuesday 26th July. Two ladders, a compressor and a battery were stolen. If you saw anything suspicious or have any information that may help with police enquiries please telephone Bicester Rural Neighbourhood Police Team on 101. Alternatively if you have information that could help but wish to remain anonymous, please call Crimestoppers on 0800 555 111.

Superintendent Kath Lowe advises that there has been an increase in burglaries across the Cherwell area and to remind everyone about home security. Don't leave doors and windows open and ensure that your home and valuables are adequately protected. Please be extra vigilant and report any suspicious circumstances immediately either on the non-emergency number, 101 or dial 999 if you witness a crime occurring.

Weston Theft

The police are appealing for information after a burglary in Bletchington Road, Weston-on-the-Green at around 12.50pm on Monday 11 July. The offenders were disturbed and left in a Blue Daewoo which was later found abandoned in Chesterton, Bicester on Wednesday 13 July. If you have any information please ring our non emergency number 101, speak to PC Bryan Groves and quote reference 43160189930.

Phone Upgrade

Fraudsters are impersonating telephone service providers and contacting their clients offering a phone upgrade on a low monthly contract. Their purpose is to glean personal and financial details which will then be used to contact the genuine phone provider and order a new mobile handset. The fraudsters either intercept the delivery or order the handset to be sent to a different address.

Remember - if it sounds too good to be true, it probably is. If a distant relative dies in Nigeria leaving you a vast fortune, which can only be transferred to you if you pay the legal fees, then hold on to your money, and don't send flowers.

Comment

In the June issue of this *News* (& subsequent email) I tried to summarise the main arguments, as I understood them, for voting *Remain* or *Leave*.

Personally I voted for *Leave*, for two overwhelming reasons, but with great anxiety. It was close; so close in North Oxfordshire that on average every other person you meet voted the opposite way to you. The reactions of people to the result was very different on each side. Had the *Remainers* won, they would have smiled a sigh of relief and the certainties of life would have gone on as before; in the event they were and are horrified. I think that many of us *Brexiters*, given a result that we didn't really expect, felt a surge of joy followed immediately by a huge pang of trepidation. We don't feel in any way triumphant or gloating, we know that very many serious uncertainties and problems are to be faced by our people and our country. Indeed they already are being – properties aren't selling, jobs are being lost, food and energy prices are beginning to creep up, foreign holidays have become more expensive, there are serious anxieties about the future of people we know who live in the EU, and EU friends who live in the UK. Many of us are deeply worried about these developments and more; there will be losses, hardships and tragedies – the heavy price of uncertainty.

However, the catastrophe that was widely forecast by 'experts' has not happened. Equity and bond markets have mostly more than recovered, sterling exchange rates are still within their quite recent historical ranges (and are probably where they ought to be), the City isn't leaving in droves, George Osborne's savage post-Brexit austerity budget has been torn up, interest rates are unchanged, foreign investors are buying and investing, exporters are enjoying increased sales and the IMF is now forecasting no recession and UK 2017 growth down but still ahead of Germany, France and Italy; we have a new outward-looking government under a strong principled leader. In most of the rest of the world, which has immense financial and political problems of its own, it is business as usual. As the *Remainer* William Hague has written, we are all *Leavers* now, and each one of us must get used to that fact, and help our country move on to a new and I believe brighter future. We aren't leaving Europe; indeed EU leaders have recently said that Britain will always be their closest friend and ally, and we feel the same way.

Many of us who voted *Leave* did so for two overarching linked reasons that are so persuasive that the *Remainers* had no real answer to them – a *Principle* and a *Vision*.

The *Principle* is that our free parliamentary democracy should be sovereign; we must elect our own legislature (and be able to dismiss it when we wish) and not have Regulations and Directives forced on us from somewhere else (mostly from an unelected bureaucracy), and we must have a wholly independent judiciary and a Supreme Court that is supreme. For these things, along with our unifying monarchy, millions of British men and women have fought and died. The *Vision* is that, free of the EU's 'manacles', the UK can over time reshape its economy, stimulate its inventiveness and entrepreneurship (already 80 new companies are being formed every hour of the day), encourage high-tech and high value-

add industries trading globally and, hopefully, become a leading role-model for all those other countries who wish to trade and cooperate closely together (even adopting common policies on areas like the environment), but who don't wish to be wrapped into a supra-national sclerotic institution. We are now ahead of the curve, and will be able to help others on this journey; after all Britain was the birthplace of parliamentary democracy. It will be a hard and long road, but as the wise old Henry Kissinger has recently written '...a better future cannot be reached without some sacrifice of the present. A society reluctant to accept this verity stagnates and, over decades, consumes its substance'. This disruptive vote, like the introduction of disruptive technologies, may leave some 'sacrificial' chaos in its wake as it heads out to a better future.

Inevitably, we don't know where we are heading. It may well be downhill, and for quite some time. Both sides are ready to exclaim 'We told you so', and at different times they may well both be right. Of course, we *Brexiters* are passionately convinced that we will be right in the long run.

If our Editor will allow, I will offer another article in a year's time to try to summarise how all the threats, warnings, promises and forecasts have played out. My forecast is that the UK situation will be OK, and that most of the dire *Brexit* warnings will have been mere humbug, as they were prior to the Reform Act of 1832, in which the sovereignty of the people was truly established.

Many of you know that I run a little Bible Study group on a Monday afternoon. It's a lovely group, with a regular core membership and all sorts of folk who sometimes come as well. There can be anything between half a dozen and sixteen of us in my dining room, gathered around the table, coffee cups and Bibles before us, as we listen and learn together.

One of the privileges I get is when someone reflects back something I said which has really struck them and made a difference. One person spoke recently of how they had been challenged not to speak of how the "church" can make a difference, but how "God" can make a difference. So in a hospital waiting room they'd been speaking to someone who seemed very distressed and spoke to them of how God can help, and offered to pray. The person sought them out later to say thank you.

Another remarked how I always emphasise how it's OK for us to disagree with each other - as long as we do it well! Respect doesn't mean us watering down what we think so no-one is offended; it means believing stuff strongly, but kindly and generously listening to others who disagree, and still regarding them as equally valuable human beings even when we don't like their conclusions. It's not always easy!



But it is something Jesus does: he loves people. And he doesn't make us take a 'political correctness test' before we qualify for that love. Speaking of political correctness...

All the post-Brexit mayhem has now got very close to home for me. I have always avoided party political allegiances; I think a rector should be here for everyone. And indeed, through the years, my voting pattern has been remarkably colour-blind - I've been lucky to be able to vote for the person not the party in almost every place I've lived, and by the person, I mean for a friend.

But now, as the post-Referendum political whirlwind continues, one of my closest friends, someone who used to live next door to me, someone I first met as he took down a tree next to my vicarage kitchen, someone I'd often walk the dog with, someone I'd sit down with for a glass of wine or a beer, someone I've laughed and cried with, whose kids learned to play on

my piano, a person who rarely came to my church but respected me as I rarely saw him on his natural turf but respect him - enormously - this dear friend is now standing for the leadership of the Labour party.

God gives us many gifts. The best ones are each other. Our friends. Our families. The people that know us and love us. We don't have to agree - it's a poor world when we can only speak to those who think the same way! Indeed, the friends who see the world differently often make it so much larger for us. They challenge us, they shape us, they help us, they are precious gifts that refine us and make us better too.

I thank God for the precious folk in my Monday Bible Study who help me see things freshly every week. We're on a break now, but will start again in September. Feel free to join us! And I thank God for friends like Owen Smith, a good man with a good heart, whose desire to serve has always made me search my own heart that little bit deeper.
