On-line Fraud

We receive a constant stream of advisory emails from TVP and Action Fraud over the increasingly devious attempts employed by criminals to extract personal data from people. They (the criminals) do it for a multitude of reasons, which can range from accessing bank accounts or promoting unrealistic investment schemes, to setting up fake identities or simply ordering goods online and getting others to pay.

Frequent computer users are, I'm sure, familiar with these scams, and wise to them. To those who aren't, then there are some very simple ways to avoid being caught.

First, install sensible preventative software. That's not just the well-known anti-virus packages, like Norton, McAfee or Kaspersky (or equally effective, but cheaper alternatives, like Avast! or Total AV), but also those that target so-called Malware ... the invidious "**Malicious Software**" that installs, almost innocently onto your computer and then steadily starts to take over. I've used Spybot, AdAware and MalwareBytes, but there are others. I was concerned recently to discover that a long-regarded "safe" plug-in called Web of Trust has, after years of widespread use as a signal for safe surfing, been found out for passing-on users' personal details to third parties. Don't just install these packages - use them, regularly.

Correctly installed, these programs will intercept infected emails, warn you if you arrive on a web page with malicious coding, and filter out or flag up spam and phishing emails so that you don't open them inadvertently. The simple rule is, if you're in the least bit suspicious, delete the email. If you're dubious, don't be afraid to ask a friend!

Happy New Year and apologies for missing the last issue, what with one thing and another it just didn't get done.

Well, where to start this month! I've not had many daylight walks lately, mostly in the dark before and after work, but we've been out a bit at weekends.

Probably our most interesting item this month was spotted first by Wendy while out on one of her mental cross country runs that she does. She came back most excited saying there were Red Deer in the Cover Wood, which is the woodland just above the Back Brook Bridge that has just been rebuilt (*on the way towards Deddington*). After I'd finished laughing and taking the mickey, telling her we're not in Scotland for another month, I thought I'd better go and have a look, in case the Fallow Deer had come back.

However, on entering the wood, I was most shocked to see, not more than 20 yards away from me, three hinds and a stag, with his young new antlers in velvet, and not too worried about me being there. They have been with us a couple of weeks now and seem quite happy spending most of their time in the fenced off rough ground by the brook.

Last week I was working out at Rousham. When I got back I had a look at ours in North Aston, and they have too. I wasn't sure if this was early or not, so thought I'd better check my books - especially after my last article about the Spindle tree got a lot of comments and laughter from people, who obviously know a lot more than I do about trees! Apparently James and Jeremy had a good old chuckle that I didn't know a Spindle, and James has planted lots of them. Mr and Mrs Graham also found it amusing ... ha ha! I do keep telling you, I'm no expert!

Anyway getting back to the horse chestnut; I can't think of anything more English than a good old conker tree. Just the name brings childhood memories flooding back, and even now I can't resist picking up conkers and putting them in mine and Wendy's pockets. Fred's pick-up truck is always full of them! On reading my book it turns out its not a native tree to us, but originally comes from Iran and India. Wow! Who would have known? Probably everyone but me!

Thursday 12th January 2017 ~ The Minutes

Village Meeting

MS welcomed those present to the meeting.

1. Minutes from last Meeting.

The minutes from the last Village Meeting AGM of Jan 7th 2016 were approved.

Proposed by MP and Seconded by SH.

2. Nomination of Officers

There were no nominations for new Officers.

Mark Stay, Beverly Rees and James Taylor agreed to put themselves forward to continue in their current roles as Chairman, Treasurer and Secretary respectively. With unanimous approval they were duly re-elected to continue for another year.

3. Declaration of Conflict of Interest

There was none declared by the Officers.

4. Treasurer's Report

The Village Meeting Account. The Balance remained at £2,753.97 with just a tiny bit of interest still to come. Total income for the year to date had been the precept of £600 and total expenditure £584.84 on Village insurance.

The Accounts were approved.

Proposed by MP and Seconded by JL.

5. Asset Register

The Village Asset Register was reviewed.

The old noticeboard needs to be removed and replaced with the new noticeboard (cost re £1000). The second Speed Radar needs to be added. The Speed Gun and associated equipment needs to be added. It was clarified that the costs listed on the register were not replacement costs but a nominal value put on the asset at the time of entry onto the register.

6. The Risk Assessment

This was reviewed and no change was deemed necessary.

7. Setting of the Precept

The Precept covered the village insurance and apart from the possibility of some grass cutting costs at the main road – no extra money was thought to be required.

CB proposed to keep the precept at £600. Seconded by SH and unanimously accepted.

8. Mid-Cherwell Neighbourhood Plan

MS read out a draft resolution from the MCNP that needed approval and signing.

13 voted in favour with 3 abstentions. The resolution was duly approved and signed.

KBB updated the meeting on what was happening in MCNP. He said the Plan was currently 60 pages long and being tweaked all the time. Greater information about the policies will be on display at Nicholsons on 25th Jan. KBB was very impressed by the quality of the members of the Forum and the Executive. He reminded the village that there would be an Engagement Meeting on the 25th Jan 7.00pm at the Orchard Barn, Nicholson Nurseries.

KBB said the MCNP employed a secretary who was funded by all the participating villages on a *pro rata* basis. North Aston was being asked for a contribution of £99.

Approval for this was proposed by CB and Seconded by TB, with one abstention and everyone else in favour. Motion carried.

9. Any Other Business

MP asked about funding the repair of the Village bus shelter by

the entrance to Nicholsons. CB said the damage should be covered by Nicholson Nurseries insurance.

10. Appendix.

From the minutes of the Village Forum meeting of 14th April 2016. The Annual Governance Statement 2015/16 was read out to the Meeting and the Statement was unanimously approved.

From the minutes of Village Forum 3rd Nov 2016.

The Village Meeting accounts for the year ended 31st March 2016 had been audited and BR read out the auditor's report to the Meeting. There was one minor issue which was that Section 2 of the annual return did not add up by £1.00. BR explained this was probably as a result of the rounding up of the figures.

Village Forum

1. Treasurer's Report

The balance as of 26/12/16 was £5595.85 with £309.75 cash in hand. Uncleared expenses of £204.50 included Christmas presents for senior citizens and mulled wine for *Carols on the Green*. It was noted that there were still some expenses outstanding from the Big Lunch – about £20-£30.

2. Carols on the Green review

MH commented on the lack of mince pies. MS said that mince pies had never been formally on the agenda for the *Carols on the Green*. MS asked about the fire and whether it had been lit early enough as had been suggested at the previous meeting. CB said he felt if it had been lit earlier it would have burnt down too quickly.

3. Christmas presents for Senior Citizens review

KBB – as one of them - thanked the village very much! MS said that about 50% felt slightly bemused by the gift. GH asked whether it would be more appropriate for children to get a gift. CB said that living standards had changed since the giving of gifts to senior citizens was first introduced by the village.

4. Village Noticeboard

MS said the noticeboard had arrived and was currently at Nicholsons. A date was set to help CB install the Noticeboard – Wed 18th Jan. MS had spoken to Kevin Cash who was perfectly happy to have the new noticeboard in the same position as the old one. MS said that KC did however want to "tidy up" the signage by the pillars at the entrance to St Mary's Walk to eliminate the clutter.

5. Broadband

MP said that the latest information was that the cabinets should be installed by the end of April/May. He was very disappointed that it had taken so long and wished to have details of any contacts known at Openreach in order that he could chase them up.

6. 100 Club

It was suggested that half a dozen more people needed to sign up in order to keep the 100 club lottery going. Please get in touch with Norman West.

7. Village Fête 2017

The date set for the 2017 North Aston Village Fête was agreed as the third weekend in July: Saturday 15th July

8. Mikron Theatre

As mentioned previously, the Mikron Theatre had expressed a wish to return to North Aston in 2017, and a date of Sunday 23rd July has been agreed, with performance at 1.00 pm.

9. Review of Village Forum

MS suggested this new format was still a bit muddling, especially over the names on the two accounts. (The Village *Meeting* and The Village *Fund* Accounts). It was pointed out that we can't change the name of The Village Meeting Account, and most seemed happy with the new format of four Village Forums a year and one Village Meeting (The AGM) in January. To avoid further confusion, it was agreed to retain the current nomenclature.

10. Any Other Business

MS informed the Forum that there was a formal consultation running on the possibility of Dr Radcliffe's Primary School entering into a multi-academy trust. SH elaborated, and confirmed that the will last until the 4th February.

First Aid. MS said that with the Fête, Mikron Theatre and *Carols on the Green* attracting some numbers to North Aston, he was not aware of a village First Aid Kit, and wondered whether the village should have one. GH stated he was a First Aider and commented that modern defibrillators were very effective. It was agreed to look into this.

Bus Shelter. The damage to the bus shelter outside Nicholson's was raised, and the Forum was advised that the cost of repairs would be covered by Nicholson's insurance. The question of whether the village still needed a shelter there was also discussed, and the general consensus was 'yes'.

Community Orchard. GH advertised a meeting to explore the possibility of establishing a Community Orchard. This would take place on Wednesday 22nd Feb 8.00pm in the Old Bakery.

Mowing. JDT said he was unclear about who did what mowing, where and how often. Highways done by OCC but due to budgetary measures three cuts had been reduced to one.

CDC Review. Bryn Williams mentioned that the Cherwell Local Plan Part 2 review had been put back to March, and that Villages and Parishes will have an opportunity to discuss it then.

MCNP Engagement Meeting. KBB said that residents of Duns Tew would be joining North Aston at the MCNP Engagement Meeting at Nicholson's on 22nd January.

Village Signs. JT wanted to know if there was any interest in

changing what he considered to be the unattractive village signs on entering the Village to something more fitting for a "conservation area".

Kerbstones. There are still kerbstones within the village needing repair. Could the answer be to inlay them - giving more an impression of pavement edge rather than a raised platform?

11. Date for Next Meeting

The date for the next Forum was set for Thursday 13th April at 7.30 pm in the Old Bakery.

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Village Community Engagement Meeting

Held in The Orchard Barn, Nicholsons on Wednesday January 25th

This Meeting, in which we were joined by our friends from Duns Tew, was held so that we could all catch up with and comment on the progress of the development of the Plan, and examine the basis of all the Policies that the Executive and Forum have been formulating over the past 12+ months. The proposed policies fall into four major categories – Transport and Traffic, Development, Housing and Community Infrastructure. Interesting display boards gave the outline of all the policies, which when finally adopted, inspected and accepted will form the background in law to all Planning activity in our area.

Once again, Martin Lipson, Chairman of the Forum, came and guided us through all this and addressed many pertinent questions in the discussion.

Among these were:

- **Should we have a Dark Skies Policy?** Yes. Rural light pollution needs limiting as much as possible, though we can do nothing about the existing lights.
- **Can we actually have measures that limit the traffic volume and speed?** Mostly no, because these are Highways issues, and not CDC Planning. But our concerns are in a document already prepared for discussion with OCC under our Community Action Plan – more news when it comes. For new developments, there is scope under S106 obligations (which are focused on site specific mitigation of the impact of development) to achieve traffic mitigation measures by developers.
- **Improved Bus Services.** This is very much on the Agenda, to prevent further deterioration. However, the fact is that these services, though vital to some people in our communities, are rather lightly used, and getting them prioritised is hard.
- **Poor Condition of our Roads.** It's a problem, with Highways budget cuts. Again, not a Planning matter. Highways tend not to do anything until 'the holes are big enough'.
- **Oxford Overspill.** Cherwell was required to find space for nearly 4,500 extra new houses in the next 15 years to accommodate part of Oxford's housing needs overspill. Sites all over our area were proposed, but it seems agreed that they will be built around Kidlington, Yarnton & Begbroke.
- **The role of Dorchester in the MCNP Forum.** Dorchester is the majority owner and developer of Heyford Park, and also a member of our Forum. They proposed the Plan in the first place as a 'win-win' solution to fears and plans for the future. They have funded some of the professional planning advice we have received. Is there a tension there? Yes and no. In many ways they are very helpful and cooperative. In areas where the Executive see things which we disagree with, they are saying so. Dorchester has the outline planning permission, but everyone is watching the detail. Will they apply for permission to build more than the 2,675 houses they are currently developing? They aren't saying.
- **Housing outside Heyford Park.** What about suitable housing development mix and density outside Heyford Park? Absolutely. This is a central part of the Forum's Housing Policies.
- **Local Green Spaces.** We are able to designate these to protect them for the future, with or without the cooperation of the landowner. So far we have designated none; the Green is already heavily protected.
- **Ecology and the Environment.** Where in our policies do we deal with all the ecological issues surrounding planning and development? Should not everything be tinged with this issue? The answer is very little, and the Forum needs to move on that.

We are, as always looking ahead to the growing season and making plans for the Flower & Produce Show (Saturday 26th August - TBC). To give everyone a head start the photographic competition categories this year are:

1. The Four Elements:

Earth, Air, Fire and Water

This category is open to all, and needs to comprise a full set of four photographs):

2. 'Serenity'

This category is open to all and comprises a single photograph.

3. 'Holiday'

This is for children only, and needs to be a single photograph.

All the usual rules apply: Photographs have to be unmounted, no larger than 7x5 inches (18x13cms), not taken before 1st September 2016 and not previously entered.

Well, I never!

We all use the stuff, from time to time, but do you ever wonder where SuperGlue came from? It's widely believed that the fast-acting glue was originally created as a battlefield "dressing" for sealing wounds quickly when urgent medical attention wasn't possible, but this isn't wholly true.

Cyanoacrylates - superglues - were originally a by-product of a wartime development project by Harry Coover of Kodak, who was trying to develop an ultra-clear plastic that might be suitable for military gun sights. It didn't work, so he set the formula aside for a few years. He went back to it when he



was looking for a strong, clear plastic that might be suitable for aircraft canopies, but it wasn't much good for that either ... but he chanced

to discover that, in liquid form, the cyanoacrylates were capable of sticking together almost anything very quickly, and so superglues were created.

It was some years later, in 1966, and during the Vietnam war, that cyanoacrylates were first used in medicine, and there's no doubt that many lives were saved because of the quick-acting nature of the glues. However, while suitable for military use, standard cyanoacrylates are also skin irritants, and while this is a small price to pay when faced by a life-threatening battle wound, they are not suitable for general application ... so don't try this at home. More recently, alternatives have been developed that are suitable for medical use, and are now commonplace, especially in dentistry, orthopaedics and veterinary use.

So, if you cut yourself in the workshop or kitchen, don't necessarily be tempted to stick yourself back together again with superglue ... but getting a small bottle of a medically-approved cyanoacrylate could be a good idea.



The Church MATTERS



All of us have treasures

As I sit at my desk in the Rectory, I have in front of me a poem entitled "The Wise Men of Rhyme". I'll be going into Tackley School with it later today. It tells the story of the Wise Men and how they decided on the gifts they would take with them as they followed the star to find the infant Jesus in Bethlehem.

The Bible doesn't actually tell us much about the Wise Men. It doesn't tell us where they came from (other than "the East"), or how many of them there actually were, or what their names were, or what jobs they did. It doesn't tell us how far they travelled or if they had others with them or where they stayed. But it does tell us this:

"They saw the child with his mother Mary, and bowed down and worshipped him. Then they opened their treasures and presented him with gifts."

And it tells us what the gifts were - gold, frankincense and myrrh.

The important thing is this: first, they saw Jesus and worshipped. Next, they opened their treasures and gave gifts.

All of us have treasures. All of us. We are all rich one way or another. Some of us have lots of stuff - material possessions or money. That's obvious riches. But some of us have lots of time. That's a treasure many people I come across deeply wish they had. Some of us are very rich in the people around us - we have really good family and friends. Not everyone does, and this is a treasure we should hold dear if it's ours. Some of us are fortunate to have a wealth of talents - we're able to do lots of things, from music and the creative arts to sports to cookery to - well, you name it really. Others feel very poor next to some of these folk. Some are rich in compassion. Some are the life and soul of every room they walk into. Humour pours out of some. Love from others. All of us have treasures. All of us.



The thing is, the wise men found that worshipping Jesus turned treasures into gifts. The things they had weren't just for themselves anymore. They were to be shared. They were to be given away to help others. True worship does this: Love God, love people, said Jesus, later in his life. If you really get what faith is about you will do what you can to share what you have to bless others.

February ends with Shrove Tuesday, and that means that March 1st is the beginning of Lent. Instead of giving up chocolate this Lent (or biscuits, or coffee or whatever) - why not give up an hour each Sunday and come and worship with us in church? We are far from perfect, and we get very many things wrong. But we are trying to follow the example of the wise men - to see Jesus, to worship him, and as we do so to learn how to turn our treasures into gifts so that we might share what we have to bless others. Please feel free to come along and join us.

I must mention an extra February highlight in the Benefice in closing: On Feb 4th & 5th we have Sophie Cleobury bringing her Amici Choir from London over to Steeple Aston. They were last here three years ago, and they were stunning. Don't miss out! 7.30pm on Saturday 4th, tickets £10 for the concert (proceeds to the Steeple church building project), available on the door or in advance, and they will also be singing in the 11am service there on Sunday 5th. Do come along and enjoy the occasion.
