North Aston Nature Notes

With Stephen Rees

I don't think I've ever seen the Hawthorn blossom as good and big and as perfumey as it has been this year! For the last few weeks we have been treated to a wonderful display of blossom in the hedgerows below our summer house. It looked like every other bush and tree in the hedge had been covered in snow. It was a really wonderful sight to see, and hopefully this means a good year for fruit, as hawthorn in a good year of fruit in October can look like a bush on fire, especially in the last light of the evening.

Firstly then, the good news! On the Friday night of the first Bank Holiday in May, Wendy, me and penny were sat down in our summer house enjoying a bottle of wine and just staring at the view, when Wendy spotted a fox coming up the hill towards us. After a few yards it disappeared into the hedge, and we knew from past experience that it was coming up the hill to try and catch out the numerous bunnies that hang out in the field just below us. So, what do you think happened next? It was only George, our one-eared rabbit, coming running out of the hedge and standing upright as proud as punch, looking round as if to say, yeah wotever! George! We couldn't believe it, as we've not seen him (her?) in months. I can't believe she (he?) has made it through the winter. That's brilliant.

About ten minutes later the almost-albino Kite that lives here, but spends most of its time down below James' house, came flying over, being mobbed by a Rook. It settled in the oak in the middle of the field, and the Rook started to circle round and round the tree, making loads of weird calls. Seconds later, other Rooks came flying in from all directions, and started to go round and round the oak as well. I'm not kidding, and I know it sounds like it's make believe, but it really happened. Ask Wendy if you don't believe me! It was very strange, and the Rooks were obviously talking to one another. Eventually they gave up and all flew off, and the kite came out and flew away.

The little owls are still in the same place and we are only seeing one at a time now, so hopefully they have nested and are sitting on eggs or have chicks. We are still watching closely and will keep you posted.

So, to the bad news for this month, and it truly is bad news, at least for me. My favourite part of our countryside is our small river, and we have got Mink back again. I have seen a dead one just below Deddington Hill, and there have been two independent sightings between Somerton and Lower Heyford. Wendy has got one in the kitchen gardens where she works, and Milly the groom has seen it with two kits (babies) following it around.



The mink hounds went out a couple of weeks ago to have a go at them along the river, but I don't know if they found any. God knows where they have come from, as our poor little river is suffering so much with invasive crayfish, cormorants, otters and water extraction. This is the last thing it needs, but hopefully Nature will find the right way forward.

Well I haven't heard the cuckoo yet. Has anyone else? Maybe it's going to be another poor year for them. We have a few more swallows down here now, but again, nothing like there have been in other years.

Our bats have started to get active in the evenings now. We have two or three different species hereabouts. I wonder if they are doing well because of the rise in fly and bug numbers? We find we're getting bitten more and more each spring, and suffering from the nasty Blandford Fly, which really makes me come up in big bumps.

My best spot this month was a Weasel. I haven't seen one in ages, and this one was running along a wall in the village - jumping up and down trying to get in small holes looking for bird nests, I bet. Wendy's best spot was a stoat running across the lawn with something in its mouth (although I think my weasel's better than your stoat, dear!).



We've had a Greater Spotted Woodpecker as a regular visitor to our feeders for the last fortnight, but I'm thinking it best we should stop putting food out now for a few months.

The last word this month comes from Norman, who has his Thrush back on his lawn. I wonder if it's the same one as last year? Hopefully it will eat all his prize veg before the Flower & Produce Show!

Stop Press! We've just had a massive swarm of bees fly over our corner (Saturday 26 May). They were all going mad over the top of Jan and Eve's garden, and finally, they settled in the apple tree between their house and Josh and Ruth's garden, making a very scary and spectacular sight - a solid lump of bees about the size of a football. Wendy and Bev donned their bee suits to try to capture them, while the rest of us watched from a safe distance. Unfortunately, they were just too awkward to get to, so the girls had no success.

After four hours, they all suddenly left the branch and flew into our garden, while we watched from inside our porch. For a moment I thought they were going to settle again, but then they flew higher, and over to Bill and Jean's house, where they hung about for a few minutes before heading into Bill's attic through a small hole near the gutter. I reckon Bill and Jean must have had a very noisy night!

One last bit - Aunty Viv has just been down to see our new bantam run, and said she saw a good Grass Snake today in the same place where she found the big skin last year, and also her son has heard a Cuckoo at Blenheim. Lucky him!

Cakes & Produce - Home-baked cakes, scones & biscuits, home-grown flowers, vegetables & fruit.



As mentioned in this month's Nature Notes, do beware the **Blandford Fly**. From May-June these beasts start biting, and they can be dangerous. Unlike mosquitoes, the Blandford simply slices out a chunk of flesh and then sucks up the blood that oozes out, but the saliva is toxic. If you are bitten, then follow the guidelines on the Surgery website: www.deddingtonsurgery.co.uk/blandford-fly-bites-advice-sheet-now-available/ Try not to scratch! A cold compress icepack may help. Take oral antihistamine. If a blister develops, don't pop it! If a serious allergic reaction sets in, and the effected limb swells up, visit the surgery in Deddington. They understand the problem, and will help.



Deddy Car Fest is back as part of the Deddington Festival (7th – 10th June). The Car Fest takes place on Sunday 10th June, between 11am and 4.30pm. Once again, rides in super and classic cars will be available throughout the day. Councillor Calling



This is Councillor Bryn Williams' "District Councillor Report" for the past 12 months.

Firstly, I'd like to thank the Parish Council for their support over the past 12 months and also for the support of our wider community. I have lived in Deddington for over 22 years and through initially being a parish councillor and now your district councillor it has enabled me to meet many people from different walks of life that otherwise I may not have. I'm extremely happy and proud to represent the Deddington Ward, which was extended two years ago due to boundary changes. This has meant that we now have three Cherwell District Councillors and, between Hugo Brown, Mike Kerford-Byrnes and myself, we represent the 13 parishes within the Deddington Ward. We've divided the ward into thirds, with Hugo taking care of the western side, Mike the eastern side and me the central area, including Deddington, the Barfords and North Aston.

At Cherwell District Council, I sit on the Personnel Committee, Standards Committee, Appeals Panel, am a reserve on the Planning Committee and the Vice Chair of the Licensing Committee. However, during the past year I relinquished my position on the Overview & Scrutiny Committee, which has allowed me additional time to attend more parish council meetings and deal with issues raised within our ward. In addition to attending parish council meetings, my phone and email are always effective ways for parishioners to contact me, and I'm glad to report that many do that and I'm delighted to be able to help in any way.

More often than not, parishioners' concerns tend to be planning related, be it their own planning application or an application that affects them in some way. Planning is an emotive subject at the best of times and I find that the best way forward is not via email but to engage the planning officers in face to face meetings on site. This allows the applicant or in some cases the objectors to share their concerns and hopefully resolve their issues. Only in extreme cases are planning applications called-in to committee as we at Cherwell are fortunate to have a dedicated, professional and extremely competent planning department who are sympathetic to communities and the environment and thus only a very small proportion of applications are brought before the committee.

Planning Officers are also willing to attend Parish Council meetings and to answer residents' questions. I know that, when this happens, residents are left knowing more about how the planning system works and why officers make the decisions they do. As I say, it's an emotive issue and difficult to please all of the people, all of the time. If you'd like me to arrange such a visit to North Aston, please feel free to ask.

We have had our fair share of planning related issues within the ward which I'm pleased to say have been resolved, sometimes following months of negotiation, site visits and revisions, but mutual agreement and approval has prevailed.

We are very fortunate in having exemplary planning officers who care deeply about our communities, our environment and conservation.

Away from planning, my responsibilities have ranged from resolving neighbour disputes, anti-social behaviour, clearing roadside hedges of litter, fly tipping (sadly on the rise), footpaths and their upkeep, regular emptying of dog bins and many other topics which crop up during the course of the year. I am more than happy to deal with these, if within my power.

I am also pleased to report that CDC's share of the Council Tax remains unchanged for a 9th consecutive year. Considering this has been achieved whilst we've been in a state of austerity and others around us have increased their share of the Council Tax, I'm extremely proud that CDC has not cut back on any of our frontline services despite the doom and gloom elsewhere. This has been achieved through 'joint working' with South Northants District Council and careful budgetary planning, another advantage of living within Cherwell and having such an efficient council.

We have had our challenges, such as the ongoing battle to maintain a fully-functioning maternity unit at the Horton General Hospital. After a lengthy campaign and some disappointments along the way I believe that now, thanks to the Independent Reconfiguration Panel, we are winning the battle.

The other major decision that Cherwell District Council faced towards the latter part of 2017 was the future of Castle Quay, and that of the proposed Castle Quay 2 development. This came about as the majority owner wanted to exit and sell their equity. CDC stepped in, not wanting to see the centre of Banbury controlled either by a third party or a disinterested investor with no reason to invest in the town. By acquiring both Castle Quay and Castle Quay 2, CDC can now shape the future of the centre of Banbury to create a worthwhile destination for the people of Cherwell and the many thousands of tourists that visit.

Finally, I would like to thank all the Parish Clerks and Members of Parish Councils who have been a great support to me over the past year, and also to the residents of North Aston, Clifton, Deddington, Hempton and the Barfords for continuing to place their trust in me to represent and to help them. I am extremely grateful and proud to represent you and despite the odd ear bashing now and again, I really do enjoy it. Thank you.

The Church MATTERS



Gardening

Anyone who knows me at all well knows that I'm not a gardener. I mean, I can mow a lawn. And I am learning to get rid of brambles - on a painfully regular basis. I've even planted a couple of trees since I moved here. But no-one's accusing me of being a gardener. Especially as I come to some of your gardens and see what you get up to.

I blame my grandmother. When I was a kid, we had a mess of rose bushes in our front garden, always choked up with weeds, and when my grandmother was feeling frustrated or cross with me, my punishment was to be sent out there to get rid of the weeds. It scarred me for life...

The Bible, of course, says that you are right and I am wrong. Gardens are always terrific places in the Bible. The first garden, Eden, is a place of pure joy, of walking unafraid with each other and with God in a place of beauty and safety. After the crucifixion, the risen Jesus is first seen again not in a tomb but in the garden nearby. A place of life and wonder, not death. Jesus even says of God, in John's Gospel, "My Father is the gardener".

Following the Royal Wedding in May, I was sitting in my garden and enjoying the peace and the sunshine and thinking about Bishop Michael Curry's words at that service. There is a power in love, a redemptive power. Maybe it was the sun, maybe it was the day, but don't you think he was right? We all need to find ways and times and places to bring more of that redemptive power of love into reality in these days?

So I'm always grateful when people take the time to show me their love for creation, for life, for one another. I'm missing the Open Gardens in Steeple this year, as I have been invited away to a dear friend's book launch. My gratitude for kindnesses shown is contrastingly large.

Mentioning that book launch, I should say - I have a book of my own coming up. Publishing theology makes no-one rich, though I do hope my book 'The Possibility of Difference' may make a few folk happy when it comes out courtesy of Kevin Mayhew publishers in September. I'll say more then!

In our ongoing church life this month, we have a Family Service on June 10th, and everyone is invited as always. Why not take the opportunity to come and join us? And do pray for our PCC meeting on June 19th - with part one of the *St Mary's For Everyone Project* slated to be complete by the end of June, we are keen to get to part two - the renovation of the lychgate and the renewal of the path, removing all steps from car park to church door. However, the various permissions we need and the last bit of fundraising look like this second part will most likely now happen next year. We are working hard to push that on! And one date fixed in all our diaries is the Fête on July 14th. I know we all look forward to this: it is a wonderful opportunity for our whole village family to join together, and perhaps to share more of that redemptive power of love.

I guess there is a trick in having an eye to see beauty in the gifts around us. Let's take every chance we can this summer to have such an eye and to see such beauty - and to be grateful to God for it all.
