

Post Office

Last year I contacted the Post Office to enquire about the possibility of a mobile van visiting North Aston once a week. Regrettably, I've had a response from Graham Simmonds, Retail Operations Manager for this area, to say that this isn't possible, due to "capacity issues and the distance it would have to travel".

However, he has offered the village a "hosted outreach service*" for one day a week for up to two hours. In order for the Post Office to set this up they would need to have an appropriate venue, and some idea of the level of interest. Would this be helpful? If you'd be interested in using the facilities of a "hosted outreach service*" once a week, please let me know

* What is a Hosted Outreach Service?

Where it is difficult to deliver services to customers, the Post Office has come up with innovative solutions that help to bring postal services to even the remotest parts of the UK.

The Post Office currently provides 'outreach' post office services to 1,500 remote rural communities. This includes many that operate out of local buildings, such as village halls or community centres, and there's also a fleet of 59 mobile Post Office vans serving over 520 communities.

The Post Office says it is committed to maintaining services to smaller, often remote, communities, helping to ensure the provision of vital Post Office services to those who otherwise might find access difficult.

Okay, I have done a couple of articles about growing up in our lovely village, and I have one more to come, but that will have to wait until next month, because an idea has been going around in my head for a couple of nights, and as I don't do notes I've got to get it written down now ... so here goes:

A North Aston for the future.

So we are going to have a communal heating system, with a ground-source heat pump, and for my money, an excellent job too! I'm getting a bit too old to spend all summer sawing, chopping and stacking logs. I'm also bored of doing the Rayburn ash-pan every morning, in the dark, and re-lighting it every night ... not to mention getting in the coal and logs, in the dark, and then Wifey having to do all the extra dusting.

North Aston Village Meeting & AGM

Thursday 19th January 2020 ~ The Minutes

Officers present: Chair Lucinda Fuoco (LF), Treasurer Sue Hatzigeorgiou (SH), Secretary Annie Savage (AS).

Those present: James Taylor (JDT), David Hanna (DH), Marcus Potts (MP), Jane Durnin (JD), Trudy Busby (TB), Clive Busby (CB), Robert Hite (RH), Mark Stay (MS), Ginny Stay (GS), Bev Rees (BR), Tony Rees (TR).

Village Meeting

LF welcomed everyone to the meeting.

1. Approval of Minutes

The Minutes of the 2019 AGM were originally published in the *NA News* in February 2019 and further copies were made available to the Meeting. LF asked if any amendments were proposed and no comments were made. She then asked if the meeting approved the Minutes. Proposer: JD. Seconder: CB. The meeting duly approved the Minutes.

2. Election of Officers

The current officers all confirmed they were willing to stand for re-election. LF asked if there were any other nominations and, as none was forthcoming, she asked that the meeting approve the re-election of the cCommittee. Proposer: MP. Seconder: JD. The Committee was duly re-elected.

3. Treasurers Report

SH presented the financial statements to the meeting. The only income during the year was the Parish precept and interest and three payments were made totalling £2046.44. They were for the village insurance (£553.94), payment to the Mid-Cherwell Neighbourhood Plan (£82) and a transfer to the village fund for the defibrillator. The current balance held is £4205.66.

The only item which remains outstanding is the cost of hiring the meeting room for Village Meetings. JDT agreed this would be forwarded to SH for last year as well as the forthcoming period. A discussion was held around the appropriate level to apply for with regard to the Village Precept, and it was agreed that the same level as 2019 should be maintained, so £2,000 will be requested accordingly. The matter of kerbing continues to be under discussion and whichever solution is agreed upon, additional funding will be required.

The Meeting was asked to approve the Accounts. Proposer: GS. Seconder: JD. The Accounts were unanimously approved.

4. Kerbing and Village Shed

No progress reported on the Village Shed proposal. With regard to kerbing, MP reported that he and Niel Nicholson had concluded that the cost of installing granite setts was proving prohibitive, and recommended this proposal be shelved, particularly as the discussion has run for so long without conclusion and little agreement. The meeting felt this was prudent and a discussion was held around the installation of oak posts and rails.

MP suggested we hire a stone cutter and reinstate the edge of The Green, restored to the correct position, and with low-level posts installed. TR questioned the need for rails due to appearance and cost and confirmed reflectors would be required. There was agreement that this might be a suitable solution and MP confirmed he will check with OCC Highways. NN to be asked to provide costings.

MS suggested we trialled the proposal and review the impact on speeding. AS said we needed to measure the traffic flow at specific times before and after the posts are installed. As Jeremy Taylor, the landowner, needs to be part of the discussion, the Meeting agreed to delay the decision until he is present.

5. Village Meeting & AGM, Any Other Business

1. Village Forum. MP questioned the need for separate Village and Forum Meetings. Originally it had been hoped that the two separate discussions would lead to a little less formality for the Village Forum, but as the two meetings have many topics in common, it was agreed that, in future, the two would not be separately handled, and all will be deemed Village Meetings. The Village Meeting will continue to be formally run and accounts for both funds reported. LF asked for a vote. Proposed by TB.

Seconded by JDT. The Meeting voted to accept the proposal.

2. Signage. JDT raised the question of signage at the end of Middle Aston Lane. He asked if the Nicholsons sign could be added to the village fingerpost. He will discuss with Niel and report back.

3. Planning. JD said she had been in touch with Councillor Bryn Williams regarding their planning application, which is going to appeal following the recent rejection. She asked the Meeting if the village would be prepared to write to CDC in support of the appeal. LF declared an interest in the matter, as a family member. MS confirmed the policy around planning matters, which is that the Meeting could not comment collectively on private applications but only on those which impacted the whole community. TR expressed regret for JD's position and said there was nothing to stop individuals writing directly in support.

JD then asked for clarity on the inclusion of application details in the *North Aston News*. AS explained that there was discrepancy between details of Planning Applications sent to the Secretary, by post and by email, and agreed that, going forward, she was happy to check on the CDC website against those received by email.

4. Village Sign. JD advised the Meeting that Daniel Durnin had offered to repair the damaged village sign. There was some discussion as to its location and thanks were offered to Daniel.

5. Village Noticeboard. CB reported that the village noticeboard is of poor quality and is leaking again. Tony Buxton has already repaired it once and made it watertight, but it is leaking again. AS confirmed she would ask Tony to look at it again.

6. Easter Egg Hunt. As this will be held prior to the next Meeting, LF said she is happy to organise it and asked the Meeting for permission to spend £50 on eggs. AS proposed. TB seconded.

Village Forum

1. Christmas Events

The meeting started with a review of Christmas events. Congratulations went to the singers on the *Village Wassail* for raising £300 through generous donations. An additional £170 was raised during *Carols on The Green*. MS suggested that we give all the money to a single charity each year and proposed this year we should donate to *Banbury Young Homelessness Project*. Proposed by MS. Seconded by MP.

It was agreed that *Carols on the Green* went well although LF raised the issue of parking. The traffic coming through the village was thought to be dangerous and she suggested that cones could be used. MS commented that last year the cones had been set out, but had been moved. The Meeting considered using cones with lights on top, and this should be discussed in advance of the event this year.

TB offered thanks to LF for organising the Christmas gifts and they were very much appreciated.

2. Village Fête

LF confirmed that *Pollocks* and the *Yarnton Brass Band* are booked. She has not been able to contact the lady who sells the sweets and will try to find an alternative supplier. The Ice cream van will be contacted to see if they plan to come.

It was agreed that a Fête Committee should be set up. AS said she and Tony would be happy to join. Les Parry was thought to have expressed an interest. MS/LF/SH volunteered. MP confirmed he would do the usual publicity and paperwork. The White Elephant was discussed and it was agreed that emphasis should be placed on decent quality donations only.

3. Mikron Theatre Company

The date for this year's Mikron performance has been confirmed

for Saturday 4th July, and they can offer two plays for the matinee. It was agreed that we should ask for the play about the history of Crufts. AS suggested that we should hold a village barbeque on the same evening as the marquee will be left up for the Fête, which is to be staged the following weekend.

4. Aunt Sally

TR confirmed he will progress by the next Meeting and report back on the purchase of the new backdrop.

5. 100 Club

BR confirmed the current period ends in April and the new year commences in May. Every encouragement should be given to new village members to join, and this will include the distribution of details to all village residents, not just those who already participate in the 100 Club.

6. Village Forum - Any Other Business:

1. Training. AS said that there was a training course for Village Meeting committee members being run by Oxfordshire Association of Local Councils on 30 January. She felt it might be useful if she and LF attended to ensure we are doing things correctly. The cost is £25/delegate and she asked for the Meeting to approve the expenditure. MP proposed and GS seconded.

2. Footpaths. The gate across the footpath below the Manor is now unlocked and it is possible to walk down to the road.

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Helping the NHS to help you this winter ...

Winter is traditionally the busiest time of year for the NHS, and so patients are being reminded only to use Emergency Departments in Oxford and Banbury in a real emergency.

There are a range of alternative options available for non-emergency situations to ensure you get the appropriate care you need, and save an unnecessary trip to A&E.

What's available?

- Self-care is the best choice for minor illnesses and injuries – a range of common winter ailments can be treated at home with a well-stocked medicine cabinet. Having a winter plan – such as keeping stocked up on medicines, keeping your home warm, and looking out for neighbours – can also be beneficial.
- Local pharmacies can give advice on several conditions, such as coughs, headaches, upset stomachs and skin conditions, as well as advise on stopping coughs and colds from getting worse.
- NHS 111 has call handlers who can help you choose the right health services for your needs, as well as a website. Just dial 111 to be put through to NHS 111, who can put you in touch with a clinician, a GP, or book you an appointment at your nearest minor injuries unit. You can also use NHS 111 online www.111.nhs.uk
- Minor injuries units can treat deep cuts, small burns, sprains, sports injuries, and infected wounds. The nearest MIU to North Aston is the Outpatients Department at Witney Community Hospital
- Your local GP may offer extended opening hours into the evening or at the weekend.

Most importantly, only attend Emergency Departments when there is a *genuine emergency*, such as loss of consciousness, suspected heart attack or stroke, severe breathing difficulties, or severe bleeding that cannot be stopped.

On average, between 300 and 400 patients attend Oxfordshire's A&E departments every day in winter, and a significant proportion should not be there.

You can also download Oxfordshire CCG's free smartphone app which signposts local health services and uses digital mapping to help people find their nearest health service, wherever they are in the county.



Bill Adams

May 1946 – November 2019

We are saddened to report that Bill Adams passed away suddenly on 26th November 2019.

Bill and his wife Jill moved to Greenside Cottages from Deddington in 1975, and

established their family home in North Aston. Their first son, Harry, was born in 1978, and Jonathan arrived in 1980.

Bill and Jill were always active in the village, both as members of the church and also at events, such as the annual Fête, where they managed the raffle for many years or could be found serving teas in the refreshments tent.

Bill served on the St. Mary's church PCC for many years before retiring in April 2014. He was a Church Warden for 24 years and was the PCC's representative on the Woodstock Deanery Synod for several years up to April 2000.

After almost 40 years in North Aston, and with the two boys grown up, they moved to Adderbury about 4 years ago. Bill was a keen sportsman, his particular love being the game of tennis, at which he had represented Oxfordshire. He was taken ill whilst playing tennis on the court at Adderbury, where he was a member and regular player.

His funeral, at Adderbury, on 20th December was well attended (over 100 people). Several tributes covering recollections of his family life and love of tennis illustrated his active and varied life. He was laid to rest in Adderbury churchyard.

For those who knew him well Bill was a true gentleman in every sense of the word. We offer our condolences to his wife Jill and two sons Harry and Jonathan and their families.



Oxfordshire County Council Waste Wizard

Oxfordshire is already the top-performing county in the country, recycling 58% of household waste. Residents help to make that happen but there is still more we can all do to increase the county's recycling. Now OCC has launched a new online tool to help people repair, reuse and recycle more.

The Waste Wizard is the County Council's response to what they term "the evil spell" sometimes cast over residents by *no-longer-needed items*. When the time comes to recycle or reuse them, many of us don't - we simply throw them away. The online tool allows anyone *bewitched by the bin* to enter a description of the item into the Waste Wizard, along with their postcode, to find out whether it can be repaired, reused, donated or recycled ... and if none of those solutions apply, then how best to go about the process of disposal, perhaps at a Household Waste Recycling Centre such as Ardley.



There are lots of different ways to get rid of waste but you only need one Waste Wizard to help make sure you do the right thing. The aim is to ...

- Boost the number of items that get repaired locally
- Increase the number of items reused or donated
- Cut the amount of contamination in kerbside collections and wheelie bins
- Ensure anything that can't be reused, repaired or donated is properly disposed of or recycled

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The Church MATTERS



Love, Kindness & Generosity

February brings those two contrasting Church festivals, St Valentine's Day and Ash Wednesday. Contrasting, because one is often celebrated by the world with chocolates, cards and champagne, and the other by the Church with sorrow and fasting.

Yet both are about love, and both are moments that hold truths for all of us - whether we are in the midst of a romance or all alone, or think of ourselves as being Christian or find faith rather a distant idea.

First, the Bible brings us a pretty basic idea that draws all of us together: God loves people, it's as simple as that. 'For God so loved the world...' begins one of the Bible's most famous verses. Sometimes we have a natural tendency to make God in our own image - so we have God especially love people who are like us. But the story of Jesus won't let us get away with that. God loves people. All people.

The Church has encouraged folk to celebrate St Valentine's day, to celebrate their love for another, and to find that God blesses them as they do so. Why not join us in worship on Feb 16th, the Sunday nearest Valentine's Day and ask God's blessing on you this year? Everyone welcome. And I am aware that, as I write, the Church of England's bishops last week did their best to issue a statement which (again) sounded like not everyone was welcome. Yet thousands of good Anglicans across the country wrote into newspapers, and commented online, and signed petitions to protest about this lack of kindness and generosity and love that seemed to come from our bishops. It made me very proud to be an Anglican. Indeed, following this general response, there came a point when it seemed like almost every bishop I know had condemned this strange statement of theirs... And here in North Aston let me be very clear: everyone is welcome in our Church because we passionately believe that God loves all of us equally.

Which I guess brings us to Ash Wednesday.

Because in love, all of us are imperfect, and all of us make mistakes, and all of us need a time, sometimes, to find a time and a space to open our hearts and both seek and offer forgiveness. Ash Wednesday isn't about summoning up the power to give up chocolate or renew a determination to do better than we did in 'Dry January' ('Damp January', as a friend of mine wistfully - and more accurately - calls it) it is about being honest. Sometimes, about being just a bit broken. Always, about understanding that God loves people who are honest and broken, it's as simple as that.

We're not loved because we are great. We are loved because we are. Ash Wednesday strips all the trimmings of life away and finds underneath - still God loves us. All of us. Every one. It is a stunning and precious gift. Sometimes we need to celebrate. Sometimes we need to pause and give ourselves time and take away distractions so we can really take it in. That's the point of Lent.

Our Ash Wednesday service this year is at Tackley Church at 10am on Feb 26th; if you can come - why not make the journey over to Tackley and find that space, that gift, that love for you.
