## Traffic Update ...

Four members of the Traffic Committee - Clive, Les, Marcus and Tony - had a very useful follow-up site meeting with County Council road officers in May. It was established that the road along the Green is currently within the statutory width, so there would no case for the council narrowing it. However, we then discussed possible measures to calm traffic through the village.

It was agreed that signage alone will not deter the worst and most determined offenders, who constitute the greatest threat to life and limb. The officers therefore offered to draw up a plan which would comprise a number of physical restraints but with a minimum of visual impact on the village.

They promised to submit this proposal in the near future. The next phase would be a consultation with the village, and if approved, the negotiation for funding to carry out the work.

### Planning Applications

**Gate Cottage Somerton Road North Aston OX25 6HX.** An application has been made to demolish the existing kitchen extension at the rear and erect a new single-storey extension and outbuilding. Comments are invited, and a decision is due by 20th July. Ref Nos: 21 / 01861 / LB and 21 / 0 1860 / F

**4 Hall Close North Aston OX25 6HR.** An application has been made (supplemental to a previous application, since approved) relating to the reduction in size of the extension at the east end of the building. Ref Nos: 20 / 00664 / F and 21 / 01719 / NMA

**North Aston Hall St Mary's Walk North Aston OX25 6AA.** The original application to demolish the pool building, gym and coach house beside The Hall has been approved. A decision on a secondary and related application is expected on 11th June. Ref Nos: 21 / 00989 / LB and 21 / 01360 / F

**18 The Green North Aston OX25 6HX.** A decision on the application to clear fallen limb and reduce height of a Willow was expected on 19-05-2021. Reference No: 21 / 01206 / TCA

**North Aston Hall St Mary's Walk North Aston OX25 6AA.** The application to carry out the partial strip-out of the first and second floors of The Hall is now in the Consultation Stage. The anticipated decision date was 25-05-2021, so a final announcement is imminent. Reference No: 21 / 01012 / LB

**Stable Cottage, St Mary's Walk North Aston OX25 6AA.** The application to demolish Stable Cottage and Garage, behind the Church and Hall, has been approved. Ref No: 21 / 00998 / F

**The Wolf is at the Door.** In a move which has been described as both "devastating", the inquiry into the proposed hotel and leisure complex in Chesterton by Great Wolf Resorts has concluded that the project can proceed. A spokesperson for local residents said: "This will be one of the largest hotels outside London yet it will be situated on the edge of a village with only 800 inhabitants. We simply do not have the infrastructure to support it." In response, GWR has stated: "We are looking forward to becoming part of the community and are committed to working with residents and businesses to help ensure this resort brings economic, recreational and community benefits to Chesterton and the wider Bicester area." Work could start later this year.

**Coming Home to Roost.** Residents on the Mailing List will be aware that a revised application has been lodged with CDC for the redevelopment of the former poultry farm at Hatch End between Steeple Aston and Middle Aston (OX25 5QL). This will see the demolition of the existing buildings and the construction of new business units (CDC ref 20 / 01127 / F). There are serious concerns about the impact this may have on northbound traffic along the Middle Aston Lane, through North Aston. Comments on this proposal had to be submitted by 21st May (hence the mailing) and a decision is due by 31st July.

### The Village Defibrillator

By the time you read this, North Aston's new Sustainable Recycling Collection Point will be up and running. The Bus Shelter (perhaps we need to change the name!) outside Nicholson's will include three new recycling bins - one each for Medicinal Blister Packs, Aluminium Coffee Pods and Plastic Coffee Pods. Currently, these are not huge, while we assess the level of support, but it would be wonderful if they proved to be too small, and we needed to get bigger ones!

The **coffee pod** recycling is part of the national *Podback* scheme, which enables users of several of the most popular coffee-making machines to recycle pods that would otherwise go to landfill. These include Tassimo, Nespresso, Dolce Gusto, Starbucks and L'Or. All we ask is that you place the empty pods into a knotted or sealed leak-proof plastic bag before adding them to the correct box – choose between Aluminium or Plastic.

The **blister packs** can be of any kind, but typically will be a mix of plastic and metallic foil. These are usually dry, so don't need to be bagged, unless you prefer anonymity. The choice is yours.

We will monitor the boxes regularly. However, if you visit, and one of them is full, please let us know by calling 347356 or emailing [info@north-aston.co.uk](mailto:info@north-aston.co.uk).

### Future Plans

We are actively seeking new ideas and fresh opportunities for sustainable recycling projects. The next one in the pipeline will be **crisp and snack packets**. Again, these come in mixed media packaging, with plastics bonded to foils, and cannot be placed in the regular recycling bin.

We're open to suggestions for future schemes, and we'd also welcome volunteers able to take on the managing of new programmes. Would you be prepared to take on printer ink cartridges, for example, or toothpaste tubes?

# North Aston Nature Notes

## With Stephen Rees

Hopefully, by the time you are reading this, it has stopped raining and the sun has finally come out. I think it has been one of the wettest Mays on record – it feels like it rained every day, as well as being cold and windy.

Despite that, we managed to get out a bit and have had a few walks (mostly to Steeple shop) and have seen a few interesting things to share with you.

We have certainly seen a few fights! We've spotted Rooks fighting while other rooks crowded round to watch. We saw a pair of cock Robins fighting to the death, with feathers and claws flying. We even came across some beetles fighting in the middle of the road. They were really colourful ones, rising up on their back feet and really going for it!

We've got a Rook down here without a tail. It looks very funny in flight, but this is the second year we've seen it, so it seems to manage okay. Sadly, we haven't seen George the one-eared rabbit yet this spring, so we're not sure he has made it through the winter. He was a great character. It would be nice to think he might have had a one-eared offspring, so we'll keep looking.

The big bird feeding station out the back of our cottage is still busy every day with Jays and Woodpeckers regular visitors. I missed a fantastic photo-opportunity a few nights ago when a Greater Spotted Woodpecker flew in and landed on one of the pigeon decoys, which are there just for fun.

The Dandelion have now gone to seed and the fields have turned from yellow to white. I have read that if you fill a jam jar with water and then blow a few dandelions heads into it, it makes a good snow dome. After a few days the seeds sink to the bottom, the seed pods turn green, and then they start to sprout. Try this, top them out in a field or your lawn, and more will grow for the bees and bugs.



One weekend in late May our garden (and many others) was full of black flies that Wendy calls Parachute Bugs, because they hover and slowly fall. Tony, my big brother, told me they are really called St Mark's fly, because they usually hatch around St Mark's Day, 25th April. Their proper name is Hawthorn Fly (Latin name *Bibio marci*) and they are completely harmless, but the Pied Fly Catchers and Wagtails love them! They get to feast on them for one weekend a year. So, on to other spots ... We saw Swallows here at last on the 13th April, and Swift on the 28th, although we'd seen them much earlier by the river. Two people have told me they have

heard a Cuckoo in the valley, although none yet in the village. I haven't yet been able to get out with my cuckoo call and see if I can attract one, but will give it a go soon.

One of the very weirdest, strangest and saddest things we witnessed last month was one evening after work, while we were having a cup of tea in our summer house. As we sat there, talking about our day at work and drinking our tea, a small brown bird (unidentifiable at distance) flew across the view just in front of us. Suddenly, a jackdaw came flying in and took it out of the air, just like a Sparrowhawk does, and dropped to the ground with it. Then three other Jackdaws and a Magpie dropped in, and they all started to squabble over it. The magpie won and flew off with it. Honestly, you couldn't make it up – a real little Shakespeare drama with a murder. It was horrible.

I think that's it for now ... besides to say, I have seen four dead Hedgehogs on the road in the last week. I'm going to make some hedgehog houses and put them in the garden. I haven't seen a live one in years.

## Planning for the Future

This summer the direction for Oxfordshire as we move deeper into the 21st century will be established for the next generation.

The **Oxfordshire Plan 2050** will define the development strategy for the county for the next three decades, including both the quality and quantity of housing and the broad locations for growth. If you want to get involved in planning for this future, and that of your children ... and their children ... now is the time to take action

This is our best, and possibly only, opportunity to influence development in Oxfordshire over the next 30 years. Waiting until actual planning applications come forward is too late – we need your help engaging now as policy is formed, so that we can give our county the best chance for the future.

This **Joint Statutory Spatial Plan** is being prepared by all four of our local District Councils, together with Oxford City Council and Oxfordshire County Council.

An over-arching *Strategic Vision for Oxfordshire*, which sits above the Plan, has already been agreed. This sets out the Growth Board’s definition of ‘good growth’. The next phase in this process, with opportunity for public consultation, is due to take place this summer 2021 and it will be critical.

The Growth Board has said that the views and needs of Oxfordshire’s people should be at the heart of the *Oxfordshire Plan 2050*, which will determine every major project for the county, from house building to transport infrastructure.

## Helping Nature Thrive Along the Cherwell Valley

The villages and parishes of Somerton, Lower Heyford, Upper Heyford, Steeple Aston, North Aston, Somerton and Souldern ring the Upper Cherwell Valley Conservation Target Area, which encompasses over 1000 acres of predominately floodplain meadows and pastures.

The best examples of this habitat can support up to 40 species of grass and wildflower in just one square metre. A handful of meadows along this stretch of the Cherwell hold a high proportion of the UK’s population of a very scarce member of the parsley family - narrow-leaved water dropwort. Other wildflowers found here include meadow-rue, ragged robin, meadow saxifrage and sneezewort. One of the meadows was historically the hay meadow for North Aston village, where lots were drawn to decide which part of the meadow local people could cut.

Floodplain meadows are cut for hay or silage and afterwards they are usually grazed by sheep and cattle. In the height of summer traditional meadows produce a fantastic array of plant life, which in turn supports a whole ecosystem of pollinators, other invertebrates, fungi, mammals and birds. Otters have returned to the river in recent years and several of our ‘Red-listed’ bird species can be seen in the area, including curlew reed bunting, skylark, grey partridge, yellow wagtail, yellowhammer and bullfinch.

The wonderful sound of a Curlew’s ‘bubbling’ call slicing through the early morning mist in our river valleys is one of the most evocative sounds of springtime in Oxfordshire. Sadly, many of the Curlew’s grassland breeding sites have become more intensively grazed or more frequently mown, and the numbers of generalist predators have increased, making nests more vulnerable. Curlews continue to breed in meadows beside the River Cherwell, albeit in reduced numbers. Sadly, each year most Curlew nests are lost before hatching, and only a few young survive to fledging. Farmers and local conservation volunteers, organised by the Banbury Ornithological Society,



are working together to help conserve these wonderful birds, but their future hangs in the balance. The majority of these precious wildlife havens are on private land but it is worth mentioning that sticking to footpaths and keeping dogs on leads reduces disturbance to ground nesting birds and their vulnerable chicks and other wildlife.

Be kind to each other. Remember that the person in front of you is a person too. None of us is the whole world; and the amazing truth that Jesus brings, is that both you and I and every person we struggle with are all wonderfully, amazingly, completely loved by God. We need to trust the love. And share it.

**Church Services:** At the end of June, if all goes to plan, we will resume our full rota of weekly services across the three churches of our Benefice for the first time since early March 2020. A service in each church, each Sunday. Our weekly benefice open air communions are very much appreciated by some, and we'll stick a couple more in the diary over the summer because of that. But we are going back inside, and we're hoping it's for good! We'll be following all the guidance we are given - so keep an eye out for that. If you still want to wear a mask when the requirement is lifted of course you may. I think we'll have hand gel with us for quite some time.

But do come and worship with us: I'm glad we've had the online services - thank you so much for watching them and for all the lovely emails you've sent about them; we'll keep putting them out from time to time - but now it's time to come back to church. You are very welcome to join us.

**The Fête:** No Fête in North Aston this year, though we are looking forward to a village party later in the summer. Tackley and Steeple Aston have decided to go ahead with their Fêtes though - 3rd July & 10th July respectively - so why not make the short journey down the road and support them? Tackley's happens on the large open field next to the village hall, and Steeple's is of course on Robinson's Close, so there is plenty of open space to make sure that we can all feel safe.

**Summer Concert:** And to celebrate the gradual return to freedom that's happening - mark the evening of July 17th in your diary.
