### Planning Applications

As can be seen from the list, many applications are now running months behind schedule, but decisions on several of these are expected in the first two weeks of September.

**Lower House St Mary's Walk North Aston OX25 6AA.** An application has been made to pollard and reduce in height a very old *Robinia pseudoacacia*, now stag-headed with split trunk and dead branches, and to lift crown on a Tulip tree to allow more light into the house. A decision is expected 17th September. Reference No: 21 / 02749 / TCA

**North Aston Hall St Mary's Walk North Aston OX25 6AA.** An application has been made to remove various trees and sections of hedge to enable restoration and replanting of the gardens around the Hall, subject to TPO 21 / 02537. A decision is expected on 3rd September. Reference No: 21 / 02703 / TCA

**Bradenstoke Barn & Coach House, St Mary's Walk, OX25 6AA.** Four distinct applications relating to work proposed on both these properties remain under consultation, with decisions all now overdue. Reference Nos: 21 / 02003 / LB and 21 / 02002 / F. Also discharge notices 21 / 02017 / DISC and 21 / 02018 / DISC

**North Aston Hall St Mary's Walk North Aston OX25 6AA.** A decision on the application to carry out surgery to various trees close to the Hall was due in early August, but has not yet been announced. Reference No: 21 / 01996 / TPO

**Gate Cottage Somerton Road North Aston OX25 6HX.** A decision relating to plans to replace the existing kitchen extension at the rear of the cottage was due at the end of July, but remains unresolved. Ref Nos: 21 / 01861 / LB and 21 / 01860 / F

**18 The Green North Aston OX25 6HX.** The application relating to arboreal work on a Willow remains under consultation, and is now three months overdue. Reference No: 21 / 01206 / TCA

# North Aston Nature Notes

## With Stephen Rees

Hello all, and welcome to September – my favourite month.

I was sat down in our summer house on a Saturday afternoon last month, having a cuppa, and waiting for Mrs Rees to get back from bike ride. I was watching a combine working the other side of the valley, and it got me into reminiscing about when we were kids. My brothers and sisters all loved harvest time, watching the corn being cut, and chasing the rabbits and foxes that were hiding in the last bit of corn in the middle of the field. As the combine got nearer and nearer they reached the point where they couldn't stand it any more, and they'd make a bolt for it. In later years we'd be there with guns and would shoot them, but I hated it. It felt so wrong, as they were already scared enough from the big machines, and they had no idea what was going on.

Much better than that was what came after the harvest; the burning of the fields. Oh my goodness, what a sight to behold! For those of you much younger than me, you'll never have seen this, and maybe can't imagine what happened, but the farmers would go around the outside of the fields and push the straw on a row or two, so it wasn't too near the hedges, and then set fire to it. The flames were massive! Thick black smoke would fill the sky. This wasn't just one field, it was right across the whole valley.

Within minutes the air was full of black bits. Mum hated it! She had to dry the washing in our bedrooms. Young people today won't be able to imagine what we were seeing. Some days it looked as if the whole valley was on fire. I can't even start to think about how much damage was being done to the environment and how many poor creatures suffered. Anyway, it doesn't happen any more, but it's a vivid memory for me.

There were a few other interesting bits last month. Did any of you witness Flying Ant Day on August the 4th? At six o'clock Wendy called me outside to see what was going on. The whole sky was full of flying ants. We walked across the lawn to find loads of nests that had hatched out all at the same time. Apparently it happens every year. The young queens and all the male ants leave the nest on the same day. It can take only 5 or 6 minutes before it's over. I've never seen it before, and it was so amazing.

The blackberries have started to ripen nicely, and it looks like it will be a good harvest this year.

We've seen loads of tiny little butterflies on our Catnip these past weeks. They're very lovely, but I have no idea what they are, and Google hasn't been any help in identifying them either. Any suggestions?

Two funny things to add. I was watching a Buzzard a few days ago, doing something very strange. People say animals are dumb, but I think that's far from true. They learn very quickly. For example, when we were putting lots of food into our bird feeders, the Pheasants found it, and they came back day after day. They'd soon learnt. The Buzzard I spotted was hovering over the verge of a motorway, just like a Kestrel. Now Buzzards don't usually hover – they soar and have amazing eyesight that means they can see carrion from miles away. However, this bird, whether from watching Kestrels or by working it out for itself, had learned to hover. It was waiting for rabbits to move or come out into the open, and then it would pounce. Amazing.

It was my big bro Tony who witnessed this first, and told me about it. I wasn't sure he was right, but then I saw the same thing for myself, at 5:30 one afternoon in late August.

A few days ago I was watching a blackbird. It was standing on the grass, with its head cocked to one side, like it was listening for something. Then it hopped along a bit further, and did it again. Suddenly, it shoved its beak into the grass and pulled out a big worm. It did this three or four times and always came up with a worm. It was obviously able to hear the worms moving around underground, and knew exactly where to find them. It's amazing what you can see if you just stop and look for a bit.

Finally, we appear to have a monster in the village, harassing dogs and people. A few people have seen it, and from the descriptions, I think it's a mink. If you start to lose fish from your pond, or hens, let me know! Cheers for now.

# Broadband



Those on the village mailing list will have had an update, and in some cases a rap across the knuckles, because the initial response to last month's appeal to "pledge" Gigabit Vouchers to the FTTP scheme was dire. The email sent out at the end of August prompted some more households to sign up, and has helped to raise the total "pledged" to just over £100,000, but that is only 30% of the total we need if this initiative is to succeed.

When we went through the first stage of preparing for this project, 80 households in the village said they would support the scheme. So far, only 26 homes and 15 businesses have followed through with a 'pledge', which is well short of the number we need.

If you are one of those who've still not yet visited the website and offered your pledge to the scheme, please do it now. It will take five minutes, that's all, yet it could transform North Aston for generations to come.

As was stressed in the email sent out last month, and explained in the August edition of the *North Aston News*, if you are already a broadband user, this vital development to bring future-proofed fibre connectivity to every property in the village will cost you nothing. However, if we can't get the full support of the community, it may never happen at all.

The residents of North Aston are fortunate to be at the head of the queue as this new technology is introduced country-wide. Please, don't squander the opportunity by sitting on your hands, or leaving it too late. We need everyone to pledge their vouchers to the scheme, and to do it soon.

If you haven't yet made that pledge, and you decide not to, then the project might never happen. If, by chance, we do get sufficient subscribers, even without your help, and it goes ahead without you, then your home will be left out. If you own your own property, then lack of FTTP when all others around you are connected will have a significantly detrimental impact on its value. What's more, if you change your mind later, and decide to join the network, then you'll have to pay for the installation from your own pocket, and that will cost several thousand pounds. What a month! We were very busy at the station with 22 shouts encompassing RTCs, rescues, standbys, barn fires and even a light aircraft. With summer temperatures creeping up, drilling and fire fighting became increasingly taxing.

We have undertaken numerous compound drills covering pumping from open water, water relays, hazard spotting, improvisation, multiple vehicle accidents and fire simulations (shops and residential flats).

One multiple vehicle RTC saw us confronted by two cars, one being under the rear of another, with a farm telehandler's front loader through the roof of one of the vehicles. We had to remove several casualties from each of the two cars, some stable and others with life-threatening injuries. After initial stabilisation of both the farm machinery and vehicles, our IEC medics were able to assess the casualties and categorise their injuries. At this stage, rapid extraction plans were put into place, should any of the casualties rapidly decline and require immediate hospitalisation. Luckily we had a spare training pump so were able to divide into two crews and tackle both cars at the same time.

Honing and practicing rescue techniques was key to this exercise, and each casualty allowed differing extraction methods: pedal spreading, door popping, B post rip, roof fold, rear hatch removal and third door creation. Working within a team, each member was able to assess, secure, expose, reveal and remove the relevant parts of the vehicles to get the casualties out on spine boards. As a rescue service, we work to the "golden hour" principle – from the 999 call to the hospital should ideally be less than an hour, which gives any casualties



a maximum chance of survival. Okay, we were using dummies which don't scream and shout, but the drill was completed in a solid 50 minutes before clear up!


It may seem ages ago now, but back in July we had several days with record-setting high temperatures. If the hot weather returns, please remember to stay hydrated at all times. If you are barbecuing outside, make sure that all naked flames are always monitored and not left unattended. When you've finished, check that smouldering coals are fully out, and matches and cigarettes are not tossed into the dry vegetation. Don't let carelessness call us out....

## Updates from TVP

There have been various messages and advisory emails from Thames Valley Police recently, including:

### Counter Service

As was noted previously, counter service by TVP is changing, with walk-in reception counters in Bicester, HQ South in Kidlington, and Witney now permanently closed. If you would normally use one of these front counters, you'll need to seek alternative ways of contacting TVP in the future. Existing counters in Oxford, Aylesbury, Abingdon, Banbury, Newbury remain open, as well as some others further afield. TVP stress that this has no impact on officer numbers or local Police services. Further details and front counter opening times are available from [www.thamesvalley.police.uk](http://www.thamesvalley.police.uk)

In fact, TVP is actively recruiting, and is inviting applicants to join the Police Constable-Degree Holder Entry Programme (PC-DHEP). Check the website for details.

Action Fraud has received hundreds of reports about fake emails purporting to be from the NHS and offering so-called Vaccine Passports. The emails offer "digital passports" that "prove you have been vaccinated against COVID-19". The links within lead to plausible-looking websites that steal personal and financial information. If you need to prove your vaccination status, download and install the NHS App. This is not the same as the Covid 19 Track & Trace App, but is a very useful personal App that securely links to your NHS account and allows you to ... order repeat prescriptions, make and check on appointments with your GP or hospital, check on allergies and medications, and confirm your vaccine status.


