North Aston Nature Notes With Stephen Rees

We had a few days' holiday last month in Suffolk, mountain biking along beaches and following forest trails and tracks. It was really good fun and I only fell off once ... which is good for me! It was good to be in a different environment and see different types of wildlife.

We were only a couple of miles from the RSPB nature reserve at Minsmere. It has it all: heathland, marshes, coast and forest. I'd thoroughly recommend it if you're anywhere near. On our bike rides we stopped to watch Redshank on the mud flats and in stubble fields, and also saw many Stonechats. That's a little bird that I'm particularly fond of, and one we do see here, down on the flood meadows, but not many. Other birds on the estuary were Peewits (Wendy's favourite) and little Sandpipers that run along, fly a bit, then run again as they try to get to the best food before the other birds do.

My best spot was when we were pushing our bikes up an unrideable shingly bit. When we got to the dunes an Adder went straight across in front of me. It's only the second I've ever seen, and it really made my day.

Wendy found a Samphire plant and picked a bit, and we tried it. The taste was very salty but crisp and crunchy. I had a look in my books when I got home, and discovered it's been used for centuries. Shakespeare mentioned it in two of his plays. The name comes from the French "Saint Pierre", Saint Peter, the patron saint of sea-goers, through "Sampiere" to Samphire. Another common name is Glasswort. In the 17th




century it was used in the glass making industry as a source of soda ash. Commoners were allowed to collect it and sell it on market day. Best of all, maidens would put it under their straw mattresses at night because it was believed to make young men very keen and more potent. I love old English folklore!

Well that's it then for now ... although I can also recommend Suffolk Gin if you're out that way.

Your urgent help is needed ...


I'm sure none of us needs reminding of the appalling hardships some families, especially those with young children, are facing and will continue to struggle with over the coming months.

North Aston was a much-loved home for Tony, who died in August after being diagnosed with Pancreatic Cancer in April.

Although in village terms a recent resident, he was very interested in and engaged with village life. He moved out of Oxford to live with Annie in Middle Cottage in 2013 and very soon realised how much the community meant to him. He was happy to take on roles including coordinating the village Traffic Committee.



Originally from a small village in Dorset, Tony moved to Italy after he left University, where he trained as a furniture maker and restorer. He spent many years running his own small business in various workshops in Oxford before moving into research and teaching for Rycotewood Furniture College and the Department of Continuing education at the University.



His funeral was a lovely, warm celebration of a rich and interesting life and he will be much missed. *Annie*

Tony was also a highly respected academic, lecturing on design history, material and domestic culture, and publishing various papers and books, including a detailed treatise on domestic life in "early modern" (17th and 19th century) England.

North Aston Village Meeting Wednesday 26th October 2022 ~ 7 pm ~ The Old Bakery

The proposed Village Meeting for 26th October includes a review of the Mid-Cherwell Neighbourhood Plan

The Mid-Cherwell Neighbourhood Plan (NP) came into force in May 2019 and has been used to determine planning applications in all twelve member parishes since that time, including North Aston. Two reports published so far show that locally generated policies have had an impact on decisions made by Cherwell District Council. These policies were developed as a result of intensive community engagement in the period 2015-16. Further information and the original report are available on the Mid-Cherwell Neighbourhood Plan Forum website: https://mid-cherwell.org.uk/approved-plan/

Six years on, it is time for the policies of the Neighbourhood Plan to be reviewed, as a result of both national and District level changes to planning policy, and because there are new challenges - climate change, major development proposals, and more. This review will take place over the next few months and a consultant (O'Neill Homer) has been commissioned by the Mid-Cherwell Neighbourhood Plan Forum to provide support for this work, using a government grant intended for this purpose.

The starting point for the review is for each member Parish Council (or Parish Meeting) to gather views from residents on the effectiveness of the plan, and what new or revised policies they would like to see come out of the review. At the initial review the top issues were traffic, amount and type of new housing, local facilities and the environment.



Pleasantly at the tail end of summer with a crispy lawn and wilting plants we've found ourselves busy with more than 60 shouts over the last two months, comprising a number of stand-bys and fires, RTCs and humanitarian assistances.

For the two hottest days, when we were being told by the media how to apply suntan lotion and sit in the shade, we were called out to a couple of fires in the open and burning stubble – but certainly weren't rushed off our feet. However, for the following two weeks we found ourselves attending more field and wild fires than we usually would!

Several incidents saw us fire fighting for extended periods. Field and straw bale stack fires need constant watching and monitoring. Field fires find us damping down and beating the flare up arears, often working in conjunction with the farmer ploughing fire-breaks to prevent the flames spreading to surrounding arears and buildings.



Stacks of straw bales, due to their size and intensity, often require damping down of the immediate area and a "watching brief", followed by mechanical assistance – whereby the stack is slowly pulled apart to allow the fire to be treated in smaller portions and allows the dry unburnt fuel to be safely removed before it ignites. In all cases, such fires will often take several days to burn out and have to be constantly monitored. Crews are therefore rotated, but this does obviously lead to a tying up of precious resources. Not all these fires are accidental, so please be careful with naked flames and make sure all incendiaries are fully out before disposing of them.

In one 24-hour period we did need to cover Bicester station on five separate occasions, which taxed our usual good humour, but managed to provide valuable assistance to the ambulance service in helping move a poorly casualty from their front room into the waiting ambulance.

The crew attended a familiarisation visit to Oxford London Airport, in case we are called there to provided support at an emergency. This allowed close inspection of fuel depots, roads, RVPs and aircraft hangers. However, as we are always available at drill or training, the visit was cut short by responding to a RTC involving leaking fuel just outside Hopcrofts Holt – working with TVP to mop up the spill! Our visit was therefore cut slightly short....
