North Aston Nature Notes With Stephen Rees

This is Wendy and my favourite time of year for walks. The colours on the trees are so lovely now, and the light seems to be bright but not so dazzling as it is in the summer. On a nice sunny day its warm but not sticky-hot like it is in the summer.

It's been a good few weeks for wildlife down in our corner of the world. Our bats have been really busy, more so in the early morning than at night. I love watching them under the canopy of our trees, darting in and out catching moths. It always seems amazing that their normal eyesight is fairly poor, and they use a form of radar.

Our owls have been very vocal too, as they always are at this time of year. Little Owls screeching, and my favourite Tawny Owls hooting all night outside our bedroom. The sound makes me think that we're living in their home, and not the other way round. We are so lucky to live with them.

One Wednesday, towards the end of October, I saw the first arrival of Fieldfares flying over us, chattering away as they do. Last year we didn't see as many as we have in previous years, so I'm hoping there will be lots this year. They will be followed shortly by other migrants birds, like the Thrushes, Redwings, Jays and many others who live with us through the winter. My favourite is the Woodcock, but we see them very rarely now, especially as we're not running any working dogs through the rough wet scrubby hedges and ditches. We are missing our dogs awfully, and to answer everyone who

keeps asking when we'll be getting another, the answer's soon, but it won't be another from a working kennel. We're thinking more of an Aunty Viv type of dog. I have an inkling for a Parson Terrier, but we'll probably end up with a mongrel pup from one of the Welsh gamekeepers we know.

So what else in the wildlife line this month? I've spotted lots of hedgehog poo down here, and along the tarmac road in front of The Hall, which is good news. There have been Muntjac barking in the middle of the night, and Aunty Viv (another mention!) saw an otter two days on the trot.



Two last things. Firstly, my favourite walk recently has been down to The Hall and then along the footpath and over to Hendon Farm, before returning to the lake and back home. It's a really lovely, easy walk with great views, and the chance to meet neighbours and friends. It's just the right distance to bring on the urge for a cup of tea and a chunk of chocolate. Sitting down by the lake, on the big red Hornton stones, and watching the Dabchicks and listening to the Coots is a delight, especially when the sun glints off of the tiny ripples made by a gentle breeze. If you're lucky, you'll see the two resident Kestrels hunting. It is so relaxing and lovely, and you can honestly feel stress and anxiety dropping out of you!

For weeks we came down each morning to find a slug trail across our kitchen floor. It seemed I'd never catch the culprit, until the middle of one day when we found it, right in the middle of the kitchen. Wendy got a piece of kitchen roll and took it outside, with the obligatory ... "and don't come back!" It was a proper ugly job – all green and blue and slimy.



A long, long time ago, slugs were considered very differently from the way they are today. There were people whose job it was to catch them, and they were known as "Sluggers". The ones they collected were impaled on Hawthorn spikes (a very revered plant) to kill them, and then the remains could be rubbed onto warts as a cure. You could also eat them to help clear, ummmm, for want of a better word ... a *blockage*.

Lastly, I had a call from a lady in Steeple Aston last week, asking me if I would like to go and see her Warwickshire Drooper. I did, of course, and what a very fine example it was too. I think I'll leave it at that for now ...

North Aston Village Meeting

Wednesday 26th October 2022 ~ 7 pm ~ The Old Bakery ~ The Minutes

Village Meeting

The Chair welcomed everyone. The new Officers introduced themselves to the meeting.

1. Treasurer's Report

NN summarised the minimal income and expenditure in the past year. Full details will be presented at the January AGM, at which the precept for 2023/24 will be set.

2. Review of Mid-Cherwell Neighbourhood Plan

Full details are available on the CDC website at www.cherwell.gov.uk/downloads/download/523/mid-cherwellneighbourhood-plan. There is a need for North Aston to participate in the mid-term review team. No nominations were received, so NN confirmed he was willing to attend to represent the village.

3. Traffic Calming

NN offered to take on the role of traffic representative for the village as no nominations were received. He circulated a summary document of a recent meeting he had attended, and of his discussions with the OCC Officer, Dave Catlin.

At present the village is entitled to £14,524 to spend on measures from Section 106 funding paid to OCC by the Dorchester Group. There are two further funding amounts to be allocated between villages affected by the Heyford Park Development, which will be confirmed by Christmas.

The meeting voted on a range of measures which could potentially be implemented within the village, and which will be further discussed once the sum available is known.

The OCC measures do not include work to prevent further accidents at The Fox crossroads. OCC has proposed to lower the speed limit from the dual carriageway to Deddington to 50mph. NN will confirm the village voted to support this. In addition, OCC proposes reducing the speed limit in the village to 20mph and to 40 mph from the Duns Tew Crossroads. OCC is considering altering the junction to improve safety.

4. Any Other Business

A discussion was held around combining the Village Meeting and Village Forum. It was agreed that in future joint meetings would be held. The minutes would differentiate between Village Meeting and Forum business.

Village Forum

1. Treasurer's Report

NN summarised the minimal income and expenditure in the past year. Full details will be presented at the January AGM.

2. Christmas

It was agreed that the traditional Wassail of carol singing around the village would take place on Sunday 11th December. MS to confirm details in the NA News/Village WhatsApp. The nominated charities for this year's donations are Homestart Banbury and Banbury Young Homeless Project.

Carols on the Green will take place from 6pm on Christmas Eve. A team of mulled wine makers was agreed and a recipe for the village to be issued! MP will upload the carol sheet to the WhatsApp group and distribute to the village mailing list.

Miranda Doggett is happy to organise the **choir** for the Christmas Carol Service at the Church on 18th December.

The Chair will pursue the question of Christmas Gifts for the elders of the village with Lucinda Fuoco.

Christmas Party for children: there are a significant number of young children in the village, so parents who would like to organise a party should contact CW.

3. Village Fête

As this has not been held for three years, the meeting considered whether it was still wanted. The major benefit was that it provided funds for the Church but involved a lot of work by villagers.

Various alternative ideas were proposed (quiz night, pudding clubs, a festival) and it was agreed that a lunch, like the Jubilee lunch this year, was probably more enjoyable and could be incorporated with other fundraising efforts to achieve a similar level of donation to the Church. This will be confirmed at the AGM.

4. Any Other Business

Broadband: MP confirmed the old scheme for full fibre had been abandoned and he has not yet heard what the replacement, if any, will look like. There appears to be capacity within the Openreach cabinet, but this does not deal with the cable installation to each house.

Speed Monitor Batteries: The monitors now have new batteries. Mullin Motor Museum in Great Tew: Historically the village agreed not to comment on planning applications unless they directly affected the village. A public consultation is being held at the end of October.

Picnic and Chris Tuffrey memorial benches: The picnic bench is beyond repair so will be disposed of. CW agreed to contact Stephen Rees regarding repair of the Chris Tuffrey bench. Date of next Meeting

The next Meeting and AGM will take place in the Old Bakery on Wednesday 11th January 2023 at 7pm.



Where your hearing comes



At one stage in mid-September, our call out total was stuck in single figures – very low when you compare that to the previous three months of over 100 shouts. However, at the end of the month we had a number of serious fires and incidents boosting our total to 19 call-outs.

The start of the month also saw us respond to a rare incident, although one we are constantly asked about – "Have you ever rescued a cat up a tree?!" So we can now all say yes, we have! Some of the crew have been waiting 15 years for this one! The cat, Clyde, had been a fair way up a lovely mature oak for most of the day. Access was limited in the owner's garden meaning we had to approach from a neighbouring property and erect the 13.5m ladder to allow access to Clyde. The form of the tree and branch positioning meant that a standard ladder pitch couldn't be achieved allowing some creative firecraft amongst the crew.



After several aborted goes, the ladder was extended to the branch below Clyde, only for him to climb up further. Eventually he came back down and 2 firefighters in *working-atheights* gear, scaled the ladder equipped with treats and a large net. After 10 minutes of cajoling, FF Louis Martin's Dolittle skills paid off, and Clyde was brought down to the great relief of the owners and was placed in a line bag and passed over the fence.

Whilst the rescue was occurring, the children watching were given a tour of the fire truck to take their minds off events.

With autumn now officially here, please remember to sweep your chimneys before lighting your fires and do take extra care with low sun during those commuting runs.

And finally, a big welcome to CJ Harber who joins us as our latest recruit.
